Our October 7, 2017 meeting will be our popular **semi-annual members' auction**. Members are encouraged to participate by consigning material (10% commission on sold lots) and bidding and buying. Our auctions are "money makers" for the Chapter Treasury and provide members the opportunity to purchase new material and to sell unwanted and excess items. Descriptions of the lots submitted to me in time for publication are listed on Pages 6 and 7 of this notification. For this meeting, there will be **no** feature presentation, "Show-and-Tell" session, or SCC Mart Books. As customary, coffee, Danish, and other sweets will be provided.

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**Summary of the Saturday, September 2, 2017 Meeting at RMPL**

Jeff Modesitt called the meeting to order with 12 members and one guest in attendance. **Items from Around the Room:** Jerry Eggleston reported that he attended the APS/APRL summer seminar on postal history at Bellefonte, PA in June. Jim Kilbane announced that Steve McGill won the Grand Award at APS Stampshow, held August 3-6 in Richmond, VA. As such, Steve's exhibit on Great Britain Machins will be the first exhibit eligible to compete in next year's APS Champion of Champions competition. (Congratulations, Steve!) Our guest, Dave Petersen, introduced himself as an SCC member who with his wife and three-year-old child moved recently to the Denver area from San Francisco. Dave specializes in Danish West Indies and indicated he will be attending our future meetings on a regular basis. Roger Cichorz mentioned the upcoming SCC Library auction #48 that will close October 15 and some new literature acquisitions for the SCCL. Asked about where one could find this information, Roger pointed out that Paul Albright posts these items in the "New Library Acquisitions" feature on the SCC Website. Jeff mentioned that he also attended the Richmond show and decided (fortunately!) to skip a visit to Charlottesville, which was originally on his trip itinerary. Jeff opined that APS Stampshow 2017 had OK attendance and was a good show, but no more so than our regional Rocky Mountain Stamp Show. Eric Carlson asked why DWI stamps were denominated in cents rather than öre, and Howard Benson offered the explanation that the Caribbean area was traditionally tied in with the U.S. dollar. Steve Nadler announced that he will be giving the Second Saturday program at RMPL next Saturday on "Iceland Travels and Stamps" intending to show photographs of areas matching those shown on Iceland stamps. **New Business:** Jeff announced that he did not want to continue as Chapter 27 President during 2018 and brought up the issue of officer volunteers and elections. Steve Nadler, our Chapter Vice President who would normally ascend to the presidency, stated that he would rather continue in the Vice President capacity. Eric Carlson volunteered to serve as President starting in 2018 and was elected by acclaim. Roger offered to step aside, but after the absence of volunteers to succeed him, will remain on in perpetuity as Secretary/Treasurer and Chapter 27 Newsletter Editor. **Show-and-Tell Session:** The meeting consisted of an extended show-and-tell session. □ Bill Gunderson passed around five interesting modern U.S. covers with various cachets and instructional markings that he culled from his incoming mail over the years. One cover to Finland was marked "unable to deliver" and it turns out that it was posted at the time of the April 25, 2010 Icelandic volcano eruption that caused air flight cancellations to Northern Finland and other Nordic locations. □ Greg Frantz showed an Argentina "New Year's greetings" pictorial postcard of Mendoza Province postmarked Dec. 31, 1902. □ Gary Rodgers showed an Aug. 17, 2017 Denver Post article on new U.S. stamp issues along with panes of the sports balls and total eclipse issues featured. Gary also passed around an approval book of early Danish stamps that he asked members to indicate which ones they would like to see offered for sale at next month's auction. □ David Petersen showed an interesting 1915 St. Thomas, DWI cover with censor tape from East Asiatic Co. Ltd. to Scotland franked with GB ½d and 1d definitive stamps. □ Roger showed a 1937 Nazi Germany Consulate cover with the cachet of and sent from the embassy office in Trangisvaag, Faroes to Copenhagen, and a 1941 Icelandic revenue-stamped document from the Minister of Justice and Ecclesiastical Affairs granting permission for a couple to marry. □ Jeff showed a stock book of Aland and Finland items that he'd like to sell □ downsizing time at the Modesitts, no doubt at Frau Leslie's request! □ Steve shared an old primer on stamp collecting from Elmer R.

Long, Harrisburg, PA, in which actual stamps are affixed inside to demonstrate various aspects presented, and an album containing Sweden covers commemorating Olympics Games. □ Eric showed a Sweden 1974 sheetlet of ten

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stamps (*Scott* #1101), *Facit* #892-901) picturing embroidery of ten stylized animals, a 15-16<sup>th</sup> woolen quilt that is displayed at Skepptuna Church, a medieval Lutheran church in the Archdiocese of Uppsala in Stockholm County. **Prelude to Adjournment:** Because of shortage of remaining meeting time and unfamiliarity with the subject, it was decided to postpone the scheduled program, a new addition to the SCC Library's Audio-Visual section from Alan Warren titled "Early Mail and Stampless Letter Postal Markings of Sweden," and for someone to preview it for content and script before it will be presented at a future meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 11:20 AM and members who hung around participated with continued chat and perused and purchased from the selection of SCC Mart Books that Jerry Eggleston provided.

**Word for the Day: maelstrom** \ˈmɔɪl-strəm \ *noun* **1:** a powerful often violent whirlpool sucking in objects within a given radius. **\*2:** something resembling a maelstrom in turbulence. *\*“Sorkin was caught up in a tech-centric **maelstrom** of his own last year.” --Ann Hornaday, Washington Post, October 15, 2015.*

**DID YOU KNOW?** Maelstrom comes from an early Dutch proper noun that literally meant “turning stream.” The original Maelstrom is a channel with dangerous tidal currents located off the northwest coast of Norway. The word became popularized in the general vocabulary of English in reference to a powerful whirlpool, or something akin to one, in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. This was partly due to its use by writers such as Edgar Allan Poe and Jules Verne (whose writing was widely translated from French) in stories exaggerating the tempestuousness of the Norwegian current and transforming it into a whirling vortex.

## **Film Review: *The King's Choice***

*The King's Choice (Kongens nei)* was named Best Norwegian Film of 2016 by the Norwegian Film Critics Association. It was Norway's entry for the Best Foreign Language Film at the 2017 Academy Awards and it made the shortlist of nine films that were considered for an Academy Award nomination. In this year's FilmFest DC, which offered 80 films from 45 countries, the Norwegian film placed third in the Audience Award's Best Feature category.

Directed by Erik Poppe, this biographical war film was a co-production of Norway and Ireland. It focuses on King Haakon VII, who had to make the crucial decision whether Norway should continue to resist the German forces that had invaded his country or should accept the German demands and surrender to Nazi Germany and Vidkun Quisling's puppet regime. The film highlights the events that immediately precede and follow King Haakon's decision.

In the opening scene, King Haakon is playing in the snow with his three small grandchildren. (One child is Harald, Norway's current king.) His enjoyment is suddenly interrupted when he is given some devastating news—the Germans have arrived in Oslo. The date is April 9, 1940. The invaders tell the Norwegians that they have arrived to protect them from the British who have laid land mines in the local harbor. The Norwegians do not accept this benign explanation. They understand that the Germans are interested in Norway's coastline and iron ore reserves and have arrived to take control of the country. Norway had hoped to stay neutral during the war but now it is clear that this is no longer possible.

King Haakon VII had been Norway's reigning monarch since 1905, when Norway gained its independence from Sweden. Although he was only a figurehead, the Norwegians loved and respected him and looked to him for the final decision. Unlike his brother King Christian of Denmark, who surrendered his country, Haakon refused to capitulate to the Germans and became the leader of the Norwegian resistance.

The film alternates between dramatic scenes in which the king and his family are pursued by the Germans, who are particularly interested in capturing Crown Prince Olav's baby son, and scenes in which the king discusses strategic plans with government officials. In the end they manage to escape and safely reach Great Britain where Haakon and Olav lead the resistance and remain the most important inspiration to the people of Norway. Throughout the film one observes the close relationship between Haakon and his son Olav. Haakon is his son's friend and his guide.

Norway's situation during World War II is not very familiar to American audiences, and this film serves to show an important period of Norwegian history. The acting is excellent with Danish Jesper Christensen as King Haakon, Anders Baasmo Christiansen as Crown Prince Olav, and Karl Markovics as Kurt Braüer, a German diplomat who finds himself out of step with his own government and pushes unsuccessfully for Norway's neutrality. As the King and his family flee across Norway, viewers are able to catch glimpses of the magnificent countryside of Norway.

The Language Council of Norway or Språkrådet says it is concerned about the amount of English used in courses at Norwegian universities and colleges. A number of classes at higher education institutions across the country are taught entirely in English, reports broadcaster NRK. The council said that using too much English could be damaging both during studies and for life after them.

"We are particularly concerned for new students who find that almost their entire programme is in English. We are not convinced about the learning benefits, as it's not certain all students are good enough at English," Ole Våge said to NRK. Classes taught in English were beneficial but should not be prioritized at the expense of Norwegian, he said.

12. **Columbia:** mint complete sheet of 15 1979 Christmas stamps, 5 x se-tenant strips of 3, *Scott* #C684a @ \$7. **SB = \$0.50.**
13. **Denmark:** 1873 12ø & 16ø bicoloreds, *Scott* #s 29-30 @ \$10.50 for cheapest colors shades. **SB = \$3.**
14. **Denmark:** four different Danish railway parcel stamps. **SB = \$2.**
- 15 and 16. **Formosa (2 lots):** scarce forgery. **SB = \$10 each.**
17. **New Zealand:** three Victorian stamp duty revenues. **SB = \$2.**
18. **Russia / U.S.S.R:** nostalgic "The Volga Boatman" stamp packet containing six glassines of USSR 1949-59 sets from H. E. Harris (then retail \$2.30) and ~40 Russia mostly mint, mostly with overprints pre-Bolshevik stamps -- not examined so who knows what's among these? **SB = \$5.**
19. **Worldwide:** Supersafe 16-page stock book, two stock pages, and glassine envelope containing ~700 mint and used stamps, primarily topicals, consignor indicates >\$150 retail, examine. **SB = \$100.**

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**Contemporary Covers:** The next four lots consist of covers primarily addressed to me in Boulder, CO, most are franked with 1990s to present definitives and pictorial commemoratives — modern postal history, but most stamps have fine cds postmarks and can be soaked off (or in the case of self-adhesives left on cut piece) to serve as postally used stamps. *Scott* or *Facit* CVs are cited for used stamps off cover with SBs at ~10% CVs.

2. **France:** 7 covers franked with 45 stamps (22 different) and four souvenir sheets (35 stamps, *Scott* #B639 x 2, 2585a, 2668f @ \$57), total *Scott* ~ \$70). **SB = \$7.**
  3. **Iceland:** 3 covers franked with 7 stamps (4 different), *Facit* SEK96 (~\$12). **SB = \$1.**
  4. **Scandinavia/Nordic:** 8 covers (Aland, Finland, 2 Norway, & 4 Denmark) franked with a total of 20 different stamps, *Facit* SEK336 (~\$41). **SB = \$4.**
  5. **Sweden:** 13 covers franked with 112 stamps (72 different) + 1 s/s (2 stamps), considerable *Facit* premium here for many intact pairs and booklet panes, *Facit* ~SEK1692 (~\$208). **SB = \$20.**
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6. **U.S.:** 11 cacheted philatelic covers, 5 with religious themes, others are event-related, etc. **SB = \$1.**
  7. **U.S.:** 29 covers (9 small, 18 business, and 2 oversized envelopes), primarily commercial use from 1904 to 1977, many interesting corner cards, good selection of topical themes, better itemed lot @ only 25¢ a cover. **SB = \$7.**
