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

The 1885 Issue of Finland

With the formation of the Universal Postal Union, Finland, even the not a member, had to abide by the new ruling regarding uniform colors on stamps, and in order to conform with these rules, and also due to change in postal rates, four values of the then current 1875-81 issues, were reprinted in new colors, viz: 5 penni green (for printed matter), 10 penni red (for postal cards), 20 penni yellow (for inland letters) and 25 penni blue (for foreign letters).

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For the printing of these four values the old plates of the 1881 issue were used, the 2 penni value retaining its old color, namely gray. The 5, 20 and 25 penni values of the change of color stamps were released on January 1st and the 10 penni on May 1st 1885. To further meet the increasing need of high value postage stamps for use on parcel post and insured mail, two new high value stamps were authorized, namely the 5 and 10 mark, which were to be printed in bicolors so as to more readily distinguish them from the penni values, the 1 mark stamp, by order of the Post Office Department, had also been changed into a bi-colored stamp.

Clichets for the three new high value stamps in this issue were ordered from H. H. Thiele in Copenhagen, and as soon as received, printing was started at the Karta Sigillata Kontoret (Stamped Paper Office). The date of issue of the 5 and 10 mark stamps was November 13th 1885.

All of the stamps of this issue were printed at the Karta Sigillata Kontoret in sheets of two panes of 100 stamps each, except the 5 and 10 mark values that were printed in two panes of 50 each. The paper employed in the printing of this issue, was ordinary wove of fairly even texture. All of the stamps are perforated 12½ per 2 cm.

Proofs and Specimens:

Trial color proofs of the low values are generally classified as belonging to the 1881 issue, but for the bi-colored stamps several proofs are known. Perhaps the most unusual item I have known among these is a block of four in black, consisting of clichets without the network of the 1, 5 and 10 mark plus a finished clichet of the 20 penni value. This block was printed on stamp paper and gummed and of course like all other proofs of this issue comes imperforate.

Other Trial Color Proofs known are:

1 mark in black, emerald, scarlet and greenish blue.

5 mark deep violet, greenish blue, slate blue, gray blue and rose.

10 mark black, brown, greenish blue, scarlet, chocolate and sage green.

No doubt other colors besides the above exist, but I am only listing those

we have record of and have seen.

All of the values exist with handstamped "SPECIMEN" in two different types.

Shades and Varieties:

Each value in this issue is known in from five to ten distinct shades, due to the several printings made and different inks employed.

There are two major varieties in this issue namely the 5 penni and the 20 penni Tete Beche pairs, the first ranks among the great rarities in 19th century Finland.

Due to the long usage of the plates in this issue, many of the clichets became worn, causing numerous constant plate varieties, which made this issue a "collectors delight" as far as flaws and cracked plates are concerned. I shall not attempt here to list all of these errors or varieties, except those I consider of major importance. The Finnish Philatelic Society has issued a special booklet describing these in detail.

5 penni:

- The figure "5" in lower left corner with lower half completely cut off (stamp No. 63).
- 2. The figure "5" upper right corner, closed with color (stamp No. 77).
- Ruled background in shield, enclosing the Arms of Finland, instead of being solid.
- 4. Several different types showing cracked plate varieties.

10 penni:

- 1. Double transfer in "FINLAND"
- 2. Cracked plate, extending the downstroke of "P" in "PENNI" (stamp No. 92)
- 3. Cracked plate, extending horizontally through "PENNI".

 Large "gash" in bottom frame line, extending from below right circle enclosing "10" to below "PENNI".

20 penni:

- "S" in "SUOMI" obliterated by a spot void of color. (This is also constant on the 1881 issue).
- 2. The same stamp retouched, the "S" in "SUOMI" forms the figure "6".

25 penni:

- 1. Plate defect causing the "P" in "PENNIA" to form the letter "R".
- z. Tilde over "N" in "PENNIA."

1 mark:

1. Period after "I" in "SUOMI" (stamps No. 99 and 100).

As previously mentioned the above is only a fraction of the known plate varieties, all of which may be considered constant, even tho they do not occur in all printings as badly damaged clichets were replaced from time to time.

Besides the above mentioned varieties, one can find on most values double and so-called "diamond perforations," the last being a double perforation run along the same line as the first, practically obliterating all perforations, leaving a fine sharp line of short point along the edge.

In the Count Ferrari collection a copy of the 20 penni yellow, imperforate, was known. This stamp which later was in the Linz collection and was examined by me, even tho it did not show any evidence of trimming and had large margins, I would classify in the doubtful category, until at least a pair has been discovered.

Another interesting lot of varieties are pairs with unevenly spaced clichets. I have noted as much as 3 mm drop in adjoining clichets.



Cancellations:

The stamps of this issue provides a very fertile field for cancellation collectors. Great many fancy cancels, cut into cork or wood, occur, some in blue and purple as well as black. Besides these we find several types of "Franko," two types of "WARDE" (value), the large "R" (Registration), five types of "ANK" (receiving), Ship, Carrier, as well as a dozen or more rail road. Among the town cancels, several are of great interest, such as those without dater or with the date written in by hand, also several foreign towns are known, Stockholm (Sweden) being among the more common.

The number of stamps issued were as follows:

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Crude forgeries exist of all of the mark values, but cannot be considered as dangerous.

Carl E. Pelander, Scandinavian Check and Price List #9 was recently released. It contains many new listings, such as the privately perforated and rouletted stamps of Denmark, a separate section of Faroe Islands, etc.

Settling of the Midwest by the Swedes

A century ago, emigration from Sweden to the United States was at its peak, and before any noticeable let-up occurred, more than 1,250,000 Swedes had left their native land in search of better living standards in America, where liberty and freedom to pursue their various vocations were freely offered.

Since the majority of the Swedish emigrants were farmers, the sparsely populated Midwest territories offered these new arrivals a splendid opportunity to settle and continue their life under conditions that were very similar to that in their native country.

Along with their will to establish themselves as substantial citizens in their new land of adoption, the pioneers brought along the faith of their Fathers and in 1848 the Augustana Lutheran Synod was founded.

Even today, a century later, we find the Swedish influence prevalent throughout the twelve midwestern states that were originally settled by the Swedes, this being most noticeable in the states of Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa, Michigan, Kansas and Nebraska, where many institutions, churches, schools, etc. stand as a memorial to these hardy pioneers.

To commemorate the above event, a National Committee has arranged a centenary colebration, to be held June 4th, 1948, which will be attended by high Government officials from the United States as well as Sweden, the Swedish delegation being headed by H. R. H. Prince Bertil and Archbishop Erling Eiden. It is hoped that through these celebrations, the already close and friendly relationships of the two countries will be further cemented into a stronger bond of mutual understanding.

Sweden, in commemoration of the above event, issued on April 26th, a set of four stamps, depicting a pioneer plowing in front of his log-cabin, with a modern sky-scraper in the background.

On June 4th, the United States also issued a 5c commemorative stamp that was placed on 1st day sale at Chicago Post Offi e.



The new stamp is blue in color and conforms with the regulation size commemorative stamp, the design being arranged horizontally and depicting a pioneer with a "covered wagon," the six stars on each side being symbolic of the Twelve Midwestern States settled by the Swedes.

The above stamp makes the seventh U. S. stamp to honor the Scandinavian nations. Those previously issued are as follows:

1925 2c and 5c Norse-American Issue 1926 5c John Ericsson Memorial Issue

1939 3c Swedes and Finns (Delaware Issue) 1943 5c Norway and Denmark Flag Stamps





Frank W. Baker (214-L4) reports the position in the sheet of the elusive "Double Foot" variety on the 3m stamp of Finland (#175a), this stamp comes from the sheet with plate No. 210 and is stamp #50.

News of Interest

Our member E. M. G. Schroeder (#117) reports on a recent auction sale held in Sweden where a unique cover franked with the 12 ore arms type, printed on both sides, was sold for Sw. Kr. 5,000. In the sale several collections brought very high prices, and newspaper reports estimate that over 47,000 Sw. Kr. (\$11,750.00) was realized in the first 20 minutes of the sale.

The world-famous collections of Ferrars H. Tows (#37), past President of the S. C. C. are going to be offered for sale at Public Auction by Carl E. Pelander (H1) during the coming fall and winter seasons. Mr. Tows' collections, which are regarded as the outstanding in the world of the United States Possessions, have been appraised at an estimated value of about \$500,000.00. The first of these sales will begin in October when the Hawaiian portion will be offered.

Each of the 10 countries to be offered for sale have won from 8 to 10 international gold medals in various parts of the world.

We are happy to note that Mr. Tows is still going to retain his famous collection of Danish West Indies.

Lt. Col. Rainer Ahonius (#503) sent in the following regarding the recent Finnish Imperforates: In the small town of Pori the latest find of a sheet of 50 p, green (Lion type) was made. Of the previously reported "Lion Type" imperforates, to date the following have been found: 5 sheets of the 5 m. Yellow, 2 sheets of the 6 m. red and one sheet of the 5 m. purple; also an imperforate sheet of the 4 m. olive was discovered by a Postal Employee, who turned it back to the Post Office Dep't, and eventually it may find its way to the Postal Museum. As all of the Lion type stamps are printed in two panes of 100 each, odd sheets still exist and may turn up of the 5 m. yellow, 50 p. green, 5 m. purple and the above-named 4 m. olive, unless they already have been discovered by Post Office inspectors, as new and stricter regulations have been made regarding the removal of all possible errors and freaks.

A little over a year ago, a collector bought 10 sheets of the then current Red Cross stamp 1m+25p., at the window of Helsinki Post Office, and to his great surprise he discovered that one sheet was imperforate. As these stamps are printed in sheets of 100 only, it is very possible that this is the only sheet known. The collector later sold his sheet intact for F. mk. 360,000.00 or approximately \$2,700.00 (\$1.00=F. mk. 136.00).

A sheet of the 10 mk. + 2.50 m. Red Cross issue was found imperforate in the Post Office at Turku. This, however, was turned in by the clerk who tound it.

DENMARK:

The G. P. O. announces that the following postage stamps are exhausted from stock and will not be further issued:

4 o. wavy lines, Scott nr. 222

20 o. King Christian X, Scott nr. 282

40 o. King Christian Jubilee, Scott nr. 296

15 o. and 40 o. Railroad commem. stamps.

The last printing of this latter stamp was made in noticeably lighter blue color, and should be given shade distinction.

SWEDEN:

Since Febr. 10th and for the duration of unsafe ice conditions the Archipelago of Stockholm is postally served by a daily helicopter route with six island landings. Mail of all classes is carried from and to Stockholm, as well as between the islands.

On March 11th was announced new international air post fees, lowered from 30 o. (8½c) to 25 o. (7c) each 5 gr. for the U. S. mail. This does not interfere, however, with the earlier excellent air service to New York at ordinary surface rate only for mail weighing not over 5 gr.

These last mentioned stamps have caused much unfavourable comment and criticism among the philatelists, but nevertheless all of these stamps are long since obsolete, and now sold at a considerable premium.

Sweden's Literature:

"Priced Catalogue and Handbook of Sweden's Postal Stationeries 1872-1947" by Capt. S. Lillie-hook (based on the now completely sold-out P. O. Standard Handbook by Hugo Alsson), publ. in Swedish at the end of 1947, 116 pages, well and richly illustrated (many of the plates are in enlarged scale, elucidatingly retouched). Important varieties are remarked, but otherwise somewhat overspecialized in printings, papers, etc. Prices reflect the actual local market.

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Bound in an attractive heavy paper band. Price, incl. reg. book mail postage, \$1.70.

"Swedish Post Office Stamp Booklets" by Thorsten Ingeloff. A short hishory of the Swedish booklets occupies the first 5 pages and is followed by complete listing (incl. King's 1908-1948 Jubilee) on 12 pages.

Crammed with facts of interest to the students and collectors of Swedish Stamp booklets. A copy can be had for 80c (bills or mint commem. stamps) from Mr. Th. Ingeloff, Postfack 597, Stockholm, Sweden.

From the quotations given above, we note that prices in 57 years have advanced exactly 291/2 times, a truly astronomical profit.

International Exhibition Commemorative.

In connection with the International Stamp Exhibition, to be held in Helsinki, Finland, a special charity commemorative stamp will be issued, with a face value of 12 mk plus a surtax of 50 mk, the latter will cover the admission to the exhibit. This stamp will be placed on sale at a special Post Office at the exhibition and will be limited to 10 copies per person. The proposed issue will be limited to 150,000 stamps.

Our correspondent advises us that collectors in the United States, desiring this stamp may send in advance orders to the committee for the shoow; Federation of the Philatelic Societies in Finland, Helsinki, Finland. Each order must be accompanied by an international money order or bank draft for the number of stamps desired. It must be remembered that the maximum number of copies obtainable is ten, and that the price per each stamp is 62 mk (official rate of exchange is 137 mk per \$1,00).

We believe that this Exhibition is perhaps unique in more than one in-

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stance, due to the fact that it is being completely financed by the sale of a stamp. There is no charge for frames nor is there any sale of stamps permitted within the exhibition rooms, which are the famous Art Center in Helsinki.

On August 25th 1948, an honor which seldom comes to anyone, will be accorded one of our members, Lauson H. Stone (483), when a commemorative stamp will be placed on sale at Chesterfield, N. H., in memory of his famous father, Chief Justice Harlan Fiske Stone formerly of the United States Supreme

Justice Stone received his appointment from President Coolidge and under Roosevelt's administration was elevated to the high office of Chief Justice.

The S. C. C. takes this opportunity in extending congratulations to one of its most active members, and we hope to do it in person, when Mr. Stone and his family returns from their European vacation this fall.

Zachris Topelius (1818-1898) author and poet. Among the best known works of Topelius are "The Tales of the Field-Surgeon" (Valskarin kertomuksia) and his many school text-books.

Frederik Pacius born in Germany but came to Finland in early childhood, may be termed as the earliest Finnish composer, he wrote the music to many of Runeberg's epic poems in "The Songs of Ensign Stal," best known of these is the Finnish national anthem "Our Land." By the middle of the 19th century many of the best known compositions of Pacius had been published.

Johan Ludvig Runeberg (1804-77) born in Jacobstad, February 5th, 1804, is considered the foremost of Finnish poets, and even today his birthday is celobrated as a national holiday. The first volume of his poems "Dikter" was published in 1830 and in 1832 his first epic poems "Elgskyttarna" (The ElkThe POSTHORN Page 45

hunters) was published. After this a series of plays and books followed and in 1848 his best known work, the epic poem "The Songs of Ensign Stal" was published. This work has been translated into practically every known language, one English translation was published in 1925 by G. E. Stechert & Co., New York. The most fitting tribute to this great poet is given him in the Encyclopedia Britannica, "The poems of Runeberg shows the influence of the Greeks and of Goethe upon his mind; but he posses a great originality. It is hardly possible to overestimate the value of his patriotic poems as a link between the Swedish and Finnish nations."

Frederik Cygnaeus (1807-1881), even though a well known poet, was better known as a critic of Literature and Arts. He was chiefly responsible in aiding Pacius and Runeberg in promoting "Our Land" to become the national anthem.

Commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Norwegian Forestry Society (Det Norske Skogselskap) and also the 100th anniversary of the birth of its founder Axel Heiberg.

These stamps are printed in the usual commemorative size (1½ times that of the regular issue), in sheets of 100.

Both values of this issue are of similar design, showing the portrait of Axel Heiberg with top-shoots of Scandinavian spruce and the double commemorative dates 1848/1932 and 1898/1948, this design was created by Oyvind Sorensen, printing by Emil Moestue A/S in Oslo.
