## Your New Scandinavian Collectors Club

After a great deal of letter writing and telephone calling between Chicago and New York with the purpose of securing the continuity of S. C. C. with the fewest changes possible, the following sequence of events managed to do just that.

At a special meeting held in Chicago, Illinois, November 5th, 1959, the following names were placed in nomination for officers in Scandinavian Collectors Club, and submitted to New York for approval at their December 9th meeting.

At the same time a series of changes in the Constitution and by-laws also became necessary. These were suggested for the consideration of the New York group of S. C. C. at their annual meeting which was held on Wednesday December 9th, 1959, at 8 o'clock p.m. at the Collectors Club Building, 22 East 35th Street, New York, N. Y. The meeting approved the slate of officers submitted by the Chicago chapter. Also found the suggested changes in the constitution and By-laws to be satisfactory to them and the club. These changes are as follows:

1. Amend Section 1 of Article 1 so that the same shall read as follows:

"This club shall be known as the SCANDINAVIAN COLLECTORS CLUB."

2. Amend Section 2 of Article 2 so that the same shall read as follows:

"Membership shall consist of active, associate, honorary and life members. Active members shall be any resident of the continental United States. Associate members shall live elsewhere in the world. Active members shall have voting privileges."

3. Amend Section 4 of Article 2 so that the same shall read as follows:

"Life-membership may be secured upon payment of \$40.00 by an active member and \$20.00 by an associate member."

4. Amend Section 5 of Article 2 so that the same shall read as follows:

"All prospective members, active or associate, shall make applica-

tion in writing to the club. Such applications must be reviewed by the Board of Governors and presented by them together with their recommendation at the next regular meeting of the club. A  $\frac{2}{3}$  affirmative vote of the members present shall be necessary for election to membership."

5. Amend Section 1 of Article 4 so that the same shall read as follows:

"Regular monthly meetings shall be held on the fourth Thursday of each month at the quarters of the club in Chicago, Illinois. If the date of any regular meeting shall fall on a holiday, such meeting shall be held on the first available date thereafter."

6. Amend Section 2 of Article 4 so that the same shall read as follows:

"The annual meeting of the club shall be held on the second Thursday in December each year."

7. Amend Section 1 of Article 5 so that the same shall read as follows:

"The club is empowered to have local chapters thereof in various parts of the world. The location of the chapter, the scope of the territory covered by such chapter, and the delegation of powers to the officers of that chapter shall be determined by a majority vote of the Board of Governors of the Club. However, no chapter may be established unless there is before the Board a petition signed by at least 10 members desiring to establish such a chapter. Each officer and member of a chapter must be a member in good standing of the Scandinavian Collectors Club."

8. Amend Section 1 of Article 6 so that the same shall read as follows:

"Dues shall be \$2.00 annually for active members and associate members, payable in advance. An initiation fee of \$1.00 must accompany all applications for admission to the club."

9. Renumber Section 2 of Article 6 as Section 3 of Article 6 and add a new Section 2 of Article 6 to read as follows:

"Chapter dues shall be established, collected and retained by the chapter."

At a meeting of the National officers in Chicago the 28th of January, 1960, the New York chapter was accepted as #7.

So as you can see your new S. C. C. is for all practical purposes your old S. C. C.

Mr. Danielson is most receptive to suggestions of content and general make up. We will endeavor to change our publication to meet with greater approval. We must use the Posthorn as a means of preserving articles of lasting interest to future members. Let our editor have those articles for future issues.

The new officers will need your help. When you consider the time and work expended by your officers who do this with no remuneration other than the satisfaction of doing something that will benefit our club and our members.

I am sure that you will do your part and render help when requested, or offer your services when you see that help is needed.

It is our plan to keep you well informed as to the official actions of the board during the coming year. We feel it is most important that you know what your club is doing. May we hear from you on your ideas of a better Scandinavian Collectors Club.

### From the President Of the Chicago Chapter

To All Members Of S. C. C.

As you may know, the Chicago chapter of S. C. C. joined 14 other Chicago area stamp clubs in organizing a stamp exhibition in 1958. This joint show was called Compex. It was a huge success, and was repeated in 1959 with equally happy results. The Chicago chapter members had excellent exhibits in both shows, not for competition however, so ours was primarily a propaganda effort on behalf of Scandinavian philately.

The 1960 Compex will take place in the LaSalle Hotel in Chicago from May 28 to May 30th. We are again participating, and this time we would like to make the Scandinavian section the best ever. To that end, it is my pleasure on behalf of the Chicago chapter, to invite interested members of S. C. C. to show their favorite pages of stamps in the exhibition. It will be an open show and your host chapter will furnish the prizes (a Grand Award, a 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize and a S. P. A. research award).

We have been alotted 69 24x36" frames, holding six small album pages or 4 large ones per frame.

The particulars are to be found on the entry blank which is enclosed in this issue of the Posthorn.

The blank must be returned to us before May 2nd, because it may be impossible to accept all entries, and also because this is the deadline given by the printer of the Compex program.

The exhibits themselves, must be in our hands by May 20th, no exhibitor will be allowed more than 4 frames. Send your collection postpaid and insured and let your check cover the cost of the frames plus postage and insurance for the return of your collection to you.

We are sorry that this invitation is a little late in reaching you but these have been rather trying times for S. C. C.

We hope to see at least some of you in Chicago for the show. The first day ceremonies will take place Saturday, the Compex cover being a new 2½ cent envelope. The same evening you are, at \$5.00 per person, invited to a dinner dance.



## Stamp Picture Postcards of Scandinavia

The cards picturing stamps of Sweden and Norway, which I illustrated and described on page 15, 16 of the January 1959 POSTHORN, aroused considerable interest, and several readers have been good enough to lend me some additional items. Theodore E. Stevenson sends the accompanying card, produced by Ottmar Zieher of Munich, which pictures the coat of arms and some older stamps of Denmark. Zieher apparently produced at least two different sets of cards in the course of the years, as I recall having once seen another and different Zieher card for Denmark.

Lorentz W. Hinrichsen sends a set of three cards produced by the Copenhagen Philatelist Club in connection with their 1902 exhibition. The cards show a parade of Danish postmen. Apparently they are holding posters showing the stamps which were current at the time the uniforms were in use. Incidentally, they all wear bright red coats—quite a difference from the drab grey unform the U. S. mailman has to wear. The three mail carriers marching behind the horseman are carrying mail bags inscribed "Kongelig Fod Pest" (i.e. Royal Foot Mail).



Finally, Stanley Pollard sends a card showing three old Finnish stamps-5 penni green, 20 penni orange and 10 penni red. They are overprinted in black "1901". Then there are some flowers and the Finnish inscription "Onnellista Uutta Vuotta!" (Happy New Year!). I am told that this is one of many different propaganda cards issued by patriotic Finns around the time when the Finnish arms stamps (illustrated on the card) became void for interior postage and were replaced by the hated Russian double eagle stamps. At the same time, a black mourning stamp with the Finnish arms was privately printed.
