### Annual Convention at RMSS

The 2012 SCC convention at Denver was an outstanding success for which we tip the hat to Jerry Eggleston, the entire Denver Chapter and Herb Volin, who organized a day of informative and entertaining programs at the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library. We enjoyed an excellent turnout at our social events and the General

Membership Meeting. Mark Lorentzen won the Grand Award with his exhibit, *Early Mail to Denmark*, and Greg Frantz won the coveted Joanna Sliski Taylor Memorial Orrefors Crystal Bowl for *Finland Steamship Companies*. Altogether nine gold medals and numerous special prizes were awarded to SCC members – congratulations to all.

### **Board Highlights**

The board meeting was lengthy and productive. Eight members were present and proxies were in hand for the absent members. Some of the highlights of the meeting may be summarized as follows: 1) An audit was performed for the Executive Secretary's accounts and everything was found in order. The full report is published elsewhere. 2) An audit will be undertaken of the Stamp Mart's account and the results forwarded to the Treasurer and other officers. 3) The next annual meeting will be held at the Royal Philatelic Show next June at Winnipeg, Canada. The board approved Philadelphia (PNSE) and Los Angles (Sescal) as our next two convention sites. The order for the 2014 and 2015 shows will be announced in the fall after we are notified of the Nordia show dates. 4) It is election time again – Mats Roing was appointed to chair the Nominating Committee. If you are interested in serving as an officer or as a director, please be in touch with Mats. 5) The Scandinavian Philatelic Foundation is winding up its business and will donate its inventory of books and remaining cash to the SCC by year's end – a welcome and generous gift. 6) Mark Lorentzen has agreed to take on the position of Convention Coordinator and Awards Chairman; thank you, Mark. 7) The website survey results were discussed by the board and will be presented in the November journal. 8) The board also voted \$20,000 to overhaul the website in the manner previously discussed in my past letters to the membership.

Anyone may request a copy of the minutes from Steve Lund, Alan Warren or me. When the new website is up and running we will post the minutes and other timely notes there.

### Website

The board has discussed the current website at the past several meetings and in numerous email exchanges. My vision for a new more interactive site has been addressed in several earlier presidents' letters. The board unanimously authorized a \$20,000 appropriation to develop a new site. At this time, I have received three proposals from well-qualified vendors and expect to negotiate an agreement with the selected vendor by mid-August. I am especially grateful to Jay Smith and Paul Nelson, among other directors, who have offered important suggestions. The schedule calls for the new website to be up and running by the beginning of 2013. A progress report will be published in the November *Posthorn*.

### Nordia 2013 – Iceland / Royal 2013 - Winnipeg

We have received a communication from the NORDIA 2013 organizing Committee inviting us to name a commissioner and bring many fine exhibits to Iceland. The show will be held June 7-9, 2013, at Gardabaer. The timing will be difficult, as we are scheduled to hold our annual convention at Winnipeg, Manitoba, June 21-23, 2013, in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Royal Philatelic Society of



Canada. We have a strong and enthusiastic Chapter in Winnipeg and they are expecting a big turnout for the Royal. Save your miles! Both shows will be outstanding philatelic events.



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# Undercover Mail: A "NEW" DISCOVERY Mail Confiscated by the German Censors

### From Denmark & Norway to

### "Thomas Cook's" Box 506, Lisbon

This topic was apparently first mentioned by Horst Landsmann in a German Censor study group article, and formally presented on page 176 of his now-available reference work *Die Zensur von Zivilpost in Deutschland im 2 Weltkreig* [in German], published in 2008.\* However, although no further information has yet been found, few collectors seem to be aware of his reported discovery.

While apparently several different examples have now been reported, I am not aware of anything further having been written. A translation of the page 176 reads as follows:

"ABP Munich [Munich Censorship Office]- Characteristics: Open without closure.

"Some letters to the cover address PO Box 506 in Lisbon have received an unusual treatment: They bear the usual handstamp of the censor, are slit open, but not sealed closed again!

"There are examples reported from June and September 1941, so that this seems unlikely to be accidental. It is possible that these letters were objected to by the censor and not sent onward, but were stored, and only after World War II did they emerge. However, no evidence for this theory exists." (A copy of the cover he refers to is shown here as Figure 5.)

To further support that this was not an "accidental" event, two recently reported additional covers can be shown, and all involve addressing to Box 506, Lisbon. One is from Norway, and postmarked in September 1941, shown as Figures 1 and 2. The other is from Denmark and was postmarked in February 1942, shown as Figures 3 and 4.

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Discussing these covers with other serious censorship collectors, on seeing just one cover, their reaction was that it looked to be a forgery or, at best, a "made-up" cover of some kind - in other words, not real. Maybe the address was added to an unaddressed cover, and what would create the most interesting address? Box 506, Lisbon, Portugal, could easily come to mind. Then, too, forged German censor marks do exist where valuable cover creation is the object. However, adding genuine censor tapes, easily available from other genuine covers, to create rarity has been known, too. That would not seem to be the case here. I would guess. First, virtually all covers going to Box 506, Lisbon, received an arrival cancel in Lisbon. I think that a cover without a Lisbon arrival in that World War II period has to be suspect that it did not go to Lisbon. Some explanation would seem appropriate. Additionally, obviously it would have no British censorship, or clue to going beyond Lisbon if it didn't get to Lisbon.

This discovery also suggests an answer to a question that has bothered me for a long time: Why are there no "philatelic covers" to Box 506, Lisbon? Some senders were definitely philatelists, and some addressees were known collectors and, for decades before the war, specially stamped mail was common enough – first-day covers, last-day covers, sets of semi-postals and others. Even during the war, such collecting went on – but apparently not much went to Box 506, Lisbon (or Box 252, Grand Central Annex, New York City, either). Why no obvious philatelic covers? Well, here several of the known covers are very philatelic. The Landsmann Page

with the proper airmail rate of 125 øre, postmarked in Kobenhavn Oct. 14, 1940, apparently censored in Frankfurt and subsequently receiving British censorship (note P.C. 90 marking).

176 cover (Figure 5) is very philatelic, the Danish Bering set cover publicizes a local Danish show for stamp collectors (the word in the cancel says this, and is not related to "political propaganda" as I thought at first, not reading Danish). So a guess here is that "philatelic-looking covers" were not allowed through! Can any reader report a real European FDC addressed to an undercover address that had to pass German censor rules, whatever those rules in effect were about this?

The Box 506, Lisbon Thomas Cook address was a very high profile undercover address, long documented and very publicly announced in Great Britain and elsewhere where access to British services were probably available. The Canadian Box 252, Grand Central Annex, NYC, address was much less publicized and handled much less mail during the 1940-41 period of about 21 months of use. In checking Box 252 addressed covers further, one example of a Danish cover could be described as philatelic! It is shown as Figure 6 – and is interesting in a way for two reasons. First, it was not stopped by German censorship. Whether significant or not, it was not censored in Munich like Figure 5, but in Frankfurt. Second, it was not censored in Canada, like most Box 252 covers, but was censored by the British using the "P.C. 90" resealing tape. That's interesting because it appears that "ordinary" or "non-Thomas-Cook" mail out of occupied Denmark risked seizure by the British censors ▲ Figure 6. A not-confiscated Danish "Box 252" cover specifically for being "philatelic" – and more needs to be understood about that process. It might be a good guess that the British censors exempted Thomas Cook mail from that type of seizure – but it is just a guess.

#### The German censorship on these covers

German censored mail has seemed to always fall into two categories: It was passed onward, or it was returned, stamped "Zurück" or something similar, indicating it should to be returned to sender, usually with a directive with the reason, whatever the reason. However, we do know there was a third category where a letter was passed on to the Gestapo, and I don't know if much information is available about that, but some is. Could these "retained envelopes" have been even a fourth category? We also know, from some personal accounts of users of Box 506, Lisbon, writing from Europe and reflecting back after the war, that for some, only a percentage of their letters got to the addressees. Missing examples never were returned, the senders never had the police or Gestapo show up and the letters never turned up even after the war. However, no information has ever been found within the German records suggesting there were any directives to confiscate or destroy any mail by the censors. Likewise, no information has apparently surfaced about British mail confiscation of Thomas Cook undercover addressed mail that didn't pass British censor rules – and there must have been some that didn't pass, according to some of the records that have been found.

Finally, I can report yet two more covers. Another is a Danish cover that is apparently known dated from June 1942 and, while I didn't recognize it at the time a couple of years ago, another cover from Norway is recorded from March 1941. That gives a span of March 1941 to June 1942, and very likely more can be reported once collectors are alerted to this possible explanation for covers they may have, or have seen, that show seemingly missing or "incomplete" German censorship, and nothing else.

\*As a large format, nicely printed 464-page paperback book published in 2008, it is now available from U.S. booksellers (although these apparently "printed-on-demand" editions may say published in January 2009). The CD version has handstamp and cover illustrations in color, the text is searchable, and the text can be "cut and pasted" into Google translate if one wishes. (The Figure 5 illustration is shown on CD page 39 in the Munich ABP section.) The book is a significant expansion of almost all of the information in the Riemer book on German WWII civil censorship, which was last updated in 1979.

# Germany to Denmark – but not Undercover Mail Censorship and the Gestapo

### An Example of the Worst Side of German Censorship

As an example of a German cover sent from Berlin to Denmark, Figure 7 shows a cover confiscated by the German censor in Hamburg. Also shown is the note this cover contained, in Figure 8. Finally, Figure 9 shows the censor's envelope and Figure 10 the enclosed German censor's report sent to the Gestapo Headquarters in Berlin, along with the Figure 7 envelope and Figure 8 note. This cover and contents were first shown in Bruce Fisher's exhibit, Third Reich Postal Censorship, The War Years, 1939-1945. The exhibit won a gold medal at Balpex 1996. In the 15 years since being exhibited, there apparently has been little information in the philatelic press about censor reports such as this, and the first assumption has to be that few are around, because to date any that have survived have not been written about. A comment from Horst Landsmann in Germany suggests that this may be the only known example where the

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censor report and the cover and contents in question have survived together.

Here the German text of the letter in Figure 8, and the Censor report in Figure 10 explain the story. The letter writer is a woman employed at a prison in Berlin, where the addressee in Denmark is the mother of a Danish prisoner being held in the prison. The woman writing the letter explains that she would be glad to offer to relay any messages the prisoner's mother would wish to pass along to her son.

This would not be a good idea to offer in any prison, least of all in a Nazi prison. A very foreboding piece of postal history.

It does emphasize the guesses we make in looking at covers such as those of Figure 1, and even Figure 2, where we have no idea what the contents might have read.



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▲ Figure 10. The Hamburg censor's form that was filled out and submitted in Figure 9 envelope.



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
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# SCC Convention 2012: a Resounding Success!

Ib Krarup Rasmussen, editor of *Dansk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift* and business manager of DFF, contributed to discussions at the Thursday seminar. Arne Thune-Larsen of Norway, international judge, commissioner, and exhibitor, showed his outstanding Norwegian postal history.

#### Seminar

Thursday, the day before the show opened, a seminar of Nordic topics was presented at the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library (RMPL) in Denver, organized by Herb Volin and Jerry Eggleston.


Speakers and topics included Alan Warren on first-day covers of the

Fredrik IX Issues of Denmark, Jerry Moore on Swedish Perfins, Mats Roing on the local delivery cancellations of Stockholm, Roger Quinby on mixed franking of Finland 1891-1918 and Geoffrey Noer on Faroe Islands postal history before 1975. Following the presentations, Paul Albright of SCC's Library Committee led visitors on a tour of the RMPL and the SCC collections within it. The evening concluded with an informal dinner at a Danish restaurant in downtown Denver.

#### **Board of Directors Meeting**

Friday afternoon the SCC Board of Directors gathered for its annual meeting at the show hotel. Reports from the former Executive Secretary Don Brent, Treasurer Kauko Aro, Paul Albright for the

SCC Library Committee and former Mart Manager Jerry Eggleston were approved. Future conventions were confirmed in Winnipeg for 2013, Chicagopex for 2016 and Westpex for 2017. The 2014 and 2015 venues are held in abeyance until The Nordia 2014 details are known for Norway. Likely candidates for those two years include Sescal in Los Angeles and Philadelphia National Stamp Exhibition near Valley Forge, Pa. An international SCC meeting, but not the

convention, will be held at the FIP New York 2016 world exhibition in Manhattan, N.Y.

In other actions, Mats Roing was appointed chair of the Nominating Committee. SCC also voted to have a booth at the APS show in Sacramento in August 2012. The Scandinavian Philatelic Foundation is still working on closing down, with the likelihood of turning its assets over to SCC. Mark Lorentzen volunteered – and was approved – for the positions

Denmark this year, Iceland in 2013, Norway in 2014 and Sweden in 2015.

The board discussed the results of the recent SCC survey concerning the future of our website. The interest and suggestions were positive, and President Roger Quinby is pursuing proposals for a




be turned over to the Mart Committee for suggestions on how best to use the items.



Golden 50-year members were also announced including Arnold Sorensen, who was present to receive his certificate.

Sorensen also was presented with the Frederick A. Brofos award for the best article in the 2011 issues of *The Posthorn*. President Roger Quinby announced that the Carl A. Pelander award for outstanding service to the Club was presented this year to the SCC Library Committee. ### Mark Lorentzen wins Show Grand Award in Denver Greg Frantz takes SCC National Award

SCC's 2012 convention, held at the Rocky Mountain Stamp Show in Denver, saw many members take some of the top awards. Mark Lorentzen won a show gold, the Postal History Society award, and the show's Grand Award with his *Early Mail to Denmark*. Greg Frantz also won a gold, the Lighthouse Stamp Society award and the SCC Joanna Sliski Taylor Memorial Bowl for his *Finland Steamship Companies*. Greg also received a gold with his *Spitzbergen 1896-1914*.

Don Brent won a gold, the APS 1900-40 Medal of Excellence and the SCC Jed Richter award for best traditional exhibit with his *Denmark's Wavy-Line Design, the Surface Printed Issues*. Mats Roing captured a gold and both the SCC Victor Engstrom award for research and the SCC Paul Jensen award for postal history with his *Stockholm Local Delivery Postmarks 1855-1924*. Kauko Aro also took a gold and the United Postal Stationery Society Marcus White award for his *The 1875 Stamp Design of Finland's Postal Stationery*.

Continuing the dazzling array of gold medal awards was Roger Quinby's *First Postal Cards of the Republic of Finland 1917-1930*, which also won the Germany Philatelic Society special prize. Ross Olson received a gold along with the AAPE Title Page Excellence award for *Sweden: The Medallion Series 1910-1919*. Rounding out the Scandinavian golds was Arne Thune-Larsen's *The Postal Communication between Norway and France up to the UPU 1876*.

In the vermeil category Roger Quinby received one, along with the AAPE award of honor for his *Lovisa Wesijärvi Railway Parcel Stamps*. Vermeil awards also went to Arnold Sorensen for *Danish West Indies Printed Matter from 1846 to 1917*, to Steve Lund with his *Lund, Sweden, Postal History 1800-2000* and to Jerry Moore for *The Perfins of Sweden*.

Mike Schumacher received a silver for *Exploring the Vatnajokull Cancel*, and another silver along with an AAPE award of honor for his *Silver Anniversary of the Reign of King Christian X 1912-1937*. The jury for Rocky Mountain Stamp Show was chaired by James Mazepa, along with judges Per Friis Mortensen of Denmark, David Piercey, Jay Stotts, Kent Wilson and apprentice Henry Marquez.

#### Auktionshaus Christoph Gärtner GmbH & Co. KG, Bietigheim-Bissingen, Germany, 8 – 12. May 2012

With much anticipation the sale of the Wilhelm Lambrecht collection of Classic Denmark Imperforate Issues took place at Christoph Gärtner's auction house. The firm produced in a special and wonderful name sale book for the entire collection in the February 2012 auction, illustrating each and every exhibit piece, and did not find a buyer for the offered price of 550,000 euros or nearly \$825,000.

In the recent May auction, the entire collection was offered in 222 single lots. One could categorize this sale to be a disappointing event, with only 75 lots selling at the total hammer price of 91,000 euros, or \$136,500 commission included. Not all the major and philatelic important pieces found buyers. The most expensive single item sold was a cover to Norway, a 72 sk. triple-rate franking (Lot 8159, shown nearby), which sold for the estimated \$15,600. A reason for the low sales rate can be blamed on the high estimates and, in today's current financial turmoil, apparently only a few had interest enough in pieces from the collection. It appears as though only some specific hand-picked beauties were sold.



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# Warren receives APS Peterson Award

### SCC Member, Author, noted for Lifetime Achievement

from APS

Alan Warren is the recipient of the second annual Charles J. Peterson Philatelic Literature Lifetime Achievement Award for furthering philatelic knowledge through philatelic literature. These achievements



may be the result of publication in traditional print and/or electronic formats, editorship, or the judging of philatelic literature.

Alan's involvement with philately and philatelic literature began in college, where he served as president of the campus stamp club and editor of the *University of Pennsylvania Philatelist*. At that time, he also became a charter member of the American First Day Cover Society and began writing the "Question Box" column for *First Days*, which he continues.

Warren's passion for philatelic literature is well known. His writing has appeared in more than 60 philatelic journals in the United States and abroad and includes feature articles, columns, and news items such as book reviews, convention reports, collector profiles, award results, obituaries, press releases and article abstracts. He also served as president of the APS Writers Unit 30.

Alan is a nationally accredited philatelic and literature judge. In addition to author and judge, he also has worn the editor hat for numerous philatelic publications, including the *Springfield-Delco* (Pa.) *Stamp Club Newsletter, SEPAD Courier* (later *PNSE Courier*), American Society of Polar Philatelists journal *Ice Cap News, Washington 2006 Bulletin* and show program and palmares, just to name a few. He was the translation co-editor for the Scandinavian Philatelic Foundation's *Coat of Arms Öre Values, Lion Type and Ring Type Stamps, Skilling Banco and Black Local Stamps*, and *AFA Specialized Catalog 1981–82:* "Bicolored Issues."

His many philatelic honors are well-deserved. Among these are the AFDCS' Distinguished Service Award, Glenn C. Michel Service Recognition Award, Honorary Life Member No. 13; Scandinavian Collectors Club, Carl E. Pelander Award for outstanding work in furthering the SCC; APS John N. Luff Award for exceptional contributions to philately; 50-Year APS member; U. S. Representative for Nordia 90; APS Writers Unit 30, Hall of Fame and Distinguished Service Award; elected Fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London; and Military Postal History Society, Outstanding Service Award.

But more important than any of these accomplishments is the manner in which Alan contributes to philately. He is courteous, self-effacing, listens well, mentors extremely well, and is a model for us all to aspire to emulate. Congratulations, Alan. You have set the bar high.

### Under Review --Icelandic Numeral Cancellation

**Icelandic Numeral Cancellation**, edited and published by the Föreningen Islandssamlarna, 2006. 114 pages, 8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> by 11 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inches, Cerlox bound, clear plastic covers, in English. Available for 150 SEK (approximately \$21) plus postage from the publisher's website: www.islandssamlarna.se.

This handbook of the numeral cancels of Iceland was first published by the Society of Iceland Collectors in Sweden in 1992, followed by revised editions in 1996 and 2005. This latest version is available either in Swedish or in English. In addition to the numerical listing of the cancels, identifying location and period of use, the book provides much background and explanatory material.

Aside from the main office in Reykjavik, there are two types of post offices in Iceland: The complete or regular post office offering a large range of services, and the receiving office that handles mostly letters and stamps. The regular offices used dated cancels, whereas the many receiving offices were assigned handstamps consisting of a number within a circle. Occasionally, a regular office would borrow a numeral cancel when its dated canceler was worn or broken, while waiting for the replacement.

The original numeral cancels (1-273) were distributed to the receiving offices in 1903. Later, more numbers were added. If a receiving office was promoted to a regular office, it converted to a dated cancel, normally of the bridge type.

Different types of numeral cancels are defined by those with slanting numbers (Type 1), those

with upright numbers (Type 2) and by the diameter of the circle. Specific problems are addressed in the introductory text, such as distinguishing between 6 and 9, or 66 and 99. A clear plastic template with these numbers is provided to aid the distinction. Forgeries are also mentioned and a few covers with numeral cancels are illustrated.

The bulk of the handbook is devoted to listings in numerical order from 1-300. The Type 1 numbers are 1-210, and Type 2 run from 211-300. Each entry shows the town or location and the period of use, where known. Some cancels were used in more than one location over time and these moves are tracked. The county where the receiving office was located is also listed. Some explanatory notes appear with each cancel. A few cancels, such as 219, were used on a number of ships over the years, and these are all identified.

An alphabetical listing by receiving office name identifies the numeral associated with it. Some receiving offices were assigned the same name, and so another list identifies the county in which they are located. A final list Icelandic Numeralcancellation



records which numeral cancel devices are now stored in the national archives in Reykjavik.

Collectors of Iceland's numeral cancels will need this handbook to help them identify the items they find, or those they are still looking for.

Revenue specialist Paul Nelson has pulled together this descriptive handbook spanning almost three

centuries of stamped revenue paper used in Norway. As such, it serves as a companion to a 2006 volume, *The Revenue Stamps of Norway*, which dealt with adhesives.

Documented here is an array of non-adhesive revenue paper spanning the governments of 16 monarchs who reigned over Norway. The differing royal monograms and a table of Norway's royal families are displayed. When possible, two signatures on the documents are identified — the person responsible for the inventory of the blank paper and/or the person who received a commission for their sale and use in commercial transactions and official records ranging from births, church confirmations, marriages and on through death and estate taxes.

A great deal of these revenue papers are in archives in Norway and Denmark and are unavailable for private collections. Nelson drew upon his own holdings and those of other collectors to compile a representative sample of these royal stamped papers.

There is a section on the manufacture of paper used for these revenue documents, the changes in royal monograms over time and

the varieties of paper manufactured over the centuries in Denmark and Norway.

A description accompanies each pictured entry in this self-published handbook, but there was no attempt to number or value the revenue paper or place estimates on their rarity.

Nelson, who is former president and current member of the board of directors of the Scandinavian Collectors Club, has made copies of this handbook available through philatelic libraries, including the SCC Library in Denver.

### Julemærker Norden

**Julemærker Norden** (Nordic Christmas Seal Catalog), 856 pages, 5 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> by 8 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> inches, perfect bound, card covers, in Danish, Otterup, Denmark, 2012. 
This year's catalog of the Christmas seals of the Nordic countries is the last in this size. In the future, only new issues or new seals from local cities or regions will be included. Seals in this edition, therefore, become the historic reference. Although the lists are in Danish, the introduction and guide to terms are in English as well. English is well done with the exception of using the term "rubber" instead of "gum."

The official national seals of Denmark begin in 1904. Values are shown in Danish kroner for perf and imperf and significant varieties. Used examples with cancels are valued at half catalog. Year packs are also valued. In a few cases, a rarity scale is used: R for more than 1,000 DKK, RR for more than 1,500 DKK and RRR for more than 2,000 DKK. The classic seals end in 1951. In that year a provisional was made by overprinting "1951" on the 1950 seals.

Also, in 1951 Denmark began issuing new seal designs in small sheets. Prices are shown for perf, imperf, perf on 3 sides, year pack, sales sign on card stock and a printing process set showing the color sequences of multi-colored issues ("Skalatryk"). Some specialty listings follow, such as postcards with Christmas themes, the Hafnia 1987 souvenirs, booklets, souvenir packs and reprints (generally 50 years after the originals). Another list illustrates Christmas meter stamps used by Post Danmark 1939-2009. The final listing for Denmark shows the Christmas PP imprints (Porto Betalt) used by Danish banks from 1988-2009.

The seals of Danish West Indies are listed 1907-16 and some more recent ones of the Virgin Islands. Next are listings for Faroes, followed by Greenland (including the childrens issues). The largest section of the catalog is devoted to the many Christmas themed charity seals of local towns and cities including those for Lions Clubs, Y's, Scouts and other organizations.

The next country Christmas seals are Norway (1906-2010), along with charitable organizations, and then Sweden (1904-2004). The latter listing includes Advent seals, Sweden's Flag Day and other charities. Finland listings date from 1908-2001 plus other



charities, followed by Iceland (1904-17) and its Thorvaldsen Society (1913-2009). Local seals and other charitable organization seals are included. Newcomers are Åland (1993-2010) and Estonia (1938-39, then 1988-2009).

Rather than an index, a detailed table of contents appears at the end of the catalog, so that seals of countries and towns and charities within them are easily located by page number. Illustrations are in color throughout. This catalog will be the key reference in the future, with subsequent editions showing only new issues or new seal-issuing entities (towns, organizations, etc.). The compilers of the catalog acknowledge the help and support of seal collectors and the importance of the Danish Christmas Seals Society (Danmarks Julemærkesamler Förening or DJF) in making this catalog possible.

### **Norway Faces Massive Post Office Closings**

The United States Postal Service is not the only postal agency whose name is underscored in red ink. Posten Norge, in an effort control expenses, is looking to shut down up to 149 post offices by 2014. While

this seems like a small number, by U.S. comparisons, the move, according to one source, will leave only 29 operational post offices in the country (plus one on the Norwegian-controlled Arctic archipelago of Svalbard). Seven of these will be located in Oslo, and only three counties will have more than one post office.

If these closures take place as scheduled, however, there will be about 1,400 retail counters located within other businesses, which appears to be a more cost-effective and, perhaps, consumer-friendly way of conducting business.

Postal executives claim that the volume of letters and cards being sent through the mail system has declined dramatically, while demand for parcel post has risen because of online shopping. As a result, there's still a need for postal services and face-to-face customer contact, but in a different form, they say. To accomplish this, postal branches that will open in retail establishments will operate in line with store hours. What this means is that these outlets, which will also sell stamps, will be open much earlier and later than traditional post offices. That, postal officials stress, adds to customer convenience instead of detracting from it.

Still, about 1,000 jobs will be affected, as well as the loss of physical post office locations. It is not yet known what types of postmarking devices will be used in the new retail locations.

# Final Nordia Update

Plans continue apace for this year's Nordia exhibition in Roskilde, a suburb of Copenhagen, Denmark, Nov. 2-4, 2012. More than 50 booths have been taken by well-known dealers, auction houses and Nordic postal



agencies. Commissioners for the show are Lars Engelbrecht of Denmark, Jan Berg of Sweden, Per Kindem of Norway, Juhani Pietilä of Finland, Árni Gústafsson of Iceland and Stephen Schumann for the United States.

Per Friis Mortensen, who served on the jury at our convention in May at the Rocky Mountain Stamp Show in Denver, will chair the jury for Nordia. Joining him on the panel are Danish judges Karsten Jensen, Ebbe Eldrup, Henrik Mouritsen, Lars Engelbrecht, Jørgen Jørgensen, Søren Juhl Hansen and Lars Peter Svendsen. Other judges include Sigurður Petursson of Iceland, Jonas Hällström and Patrik Larsson of Sweden, Ivar Sundsbø and Per Kindem of Norway, Juhani Pietilä of Finland and Stephen Schumann of the United States.

The show was oversubscribed. There are approximately 950 frames, more than half of which are reserved by Danish exhibitors. A total of 170 exhibitors are taking part in the event. The show marks the 125th anniversary of the Copenhagen Philatelists Club (KPK).

Roskilde's history dates back more than 1,000 years to the establishment of a trading post there by the Vikings. Many historic attractions in Roskilde and Copenhagen await visitors to the show in November. If you're planning to attend, it's time to make your final reservations!

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# Roger Glenn Schnell 1935-2012

Dr. Roger G. Schnell of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., died June 23 at age 76. He was the son of Wilma and Fred Schnell and was born in Sheboygan, Wis. He began his service to organized philately as president of his youth club in Sheboygan and he first exhibited at age 17.

As an author, exhibitor, judge and commissioner, Schnell was recognized nationally as well as internationally for his major achievements in philately. He went on to collect and – in many cases exhibit – a broad range of topics, including Norway, Danish West Indies, German offices abroad, Bolivia, Haiti, Iceland, Isle of Man, Pan-Pacific Clipper mail, SCADTA, OAT and many others. He exhibited at more than 40 international exhibitions and more than 80 national shows in the United States. His Danish West Indies display won the Champion of Champions in 1989 and the Grand Prix National at Norwex 97 in Oslo. He won SCC's National Award, the Joanna Sliski Taylor Memorial bowl, in 1994 for DWI postal stationery, and again in 2006 for his classic Iceland.

Roger was an ardent student of philatelic research and its literature. He authored more than 40 philatelic articles and became a trustee of the American Philatelic Research Library, where he served as Secretary for three years and was vice president at the time of his passing. He initiated APRL's Vooys Fellowship program.

His interest in Scandinavian philately is reflected in his chairing the Danish West Indies Study Group of SCC for 15 years, serving as editor of its newsletter at the same time. He was vice president of the Scandinavian Collectors Club (1991) and served as president (1992-94). In recent months he donated considerable quantities of philatelic material to SCC. The items have been turned over to the SCC Mart for evaluation as to the best way to utilize Roger's generosity.

The Club recognized him with its Frederick A. Brofos award for writing (2002), the Carl E. Pelander award for service to the Club (1997), elected him an honorary life member (2011), and named its library, held at the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library in Denver, the Roger G. Schnell SCC Library.

For the American Philatelic Society, Roger served on the board of vice presidents, was past chairman of the planning and development committee and represented APS on the FIP traditional philately commission, where he was also secretary for several years. He received the John N. Luff award for outstanding services to the APS in 2011.

Roger Schnell was president of the American Philatelic Congress 1995-99 and was president of Germany Philatelic Society Chapter 24 for 10 years. He also served as a director of Washington 2006. He was elected a fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London in 1998 and signed the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in 2006.

Dr. Schnell studied medicine at the University of Florida and the University of Indiana, and served his residency in neurology at the Mayo Clinic. As a board-certified neurologist he had his own practice in Ft. Lauderdale for more than 40 years. One of his specialized areas was magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), a diagnostic tool used to study body tissue. He was one of the first to install an MRI in an out-patient facility and wrote a number of technical articles on the subject. He was a fellow of the American Academy of Neurology, served as an expert witness and taught neurology.

Roger Schnell is survived by his wife of 52 years, Katherine, daughter Susan, son John and four grandchildren.

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### From the Stacks

### **Much Recent Activity**

I intended to devote this column to mentioning some of the successful "limited research" performed at the request of members and the utility of the Scandinavian Collectors Club Library's Exhibits and Collections (E&C) section, but three events occurred during May that necessitated shifting the subject matter in a different direction. I will postpone the discussion of these two topics until my next column. Also, I did not mention in my first two columns that I encourage your comments and criticisms about the content of this column, as well as any questions you may



have about the SCCL and its operations. Please feel free to contact me via e-mail at *rcichorz@comcast.net*, USPS mail at 3925 Longwood Ave., Boulder CO 80305-7233, U.S.A., or by telephone (303) 494-8361. Your suggestions for future column topics are always welcome.

First off, at its Friday, May 18, 2012, meeting in Denver, Colo., the SCC Board of Directors elected to name the SCCL in honor of the late Dr. Roger G. Schnell. The SCCL is now officially the "Roger G. Schnell Library of the Scandinavian Collectors Club." Roger was a frequent benefactor to the SCCL and, in fact, only two weeks before his death, he mailed us a package of donated materials that included color photocopies of four of his high-award-winning exhibits of Danish West Indies postal history. These exhibits have been integrated into the SCCL's E&C section, a topic for my next column.

Secondly, at the Saturday, May 19, 2011, SCC General Membership Meeting at the Rocky Mountain Stamp Show in Denver, President Roger Quinby announced that the Carl E. Pelander Award is presented to the six members of the SCCL Committee, a complete surprise to all six of us! This Award was created by the SCC in 1968 to perpetuate the memory of Carl E. Pelander, one of the founding members of SCC, whose exceptional characteristic was his willingness to assist fellow philatelists in all phases of Scandinavian philately. The Pelander Award has been presented 21 times to SCC members during its 45-year history for outstanding work in furthering the aims of the organization.

Thirdly, the SCCL Index is in the process of being integrated into the Philatelic Union Catalog (PUC), hosted by the American Philatelic Research Library (APRL), permitting you to search the holdings of multiple philatelic libraries simultaneously. The PUC currently includes the holdings of eight other major philatelic libraries: APRL, Collectors Club of Chicago, Collectors Club of New York, Harry Sutherland Philatelic Library at the Vincent Graves Greene Philatelic Research Foundation, Peggy J. Slusser Memorial Philatelic Library at the Postal History Foundation, Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library (RMPL), Royal Philatelic Society London and the Western Philatelic Library. The SCCL is the first library of a specialist philatelic organization to be included in the PUC and, no doubt, others will eventually follow our lead.

Paul Albright and Jeff Modesitt of the SCCL Library Committee have been doing the pioneering work to get our SCCL indices included in the PUC. Logistically, the diacritical marks of several Scandinavian languages were major impediments for searching book titles and authors' names, but APRL Librarian Tara Murray worked out the "bugs" and came up with a system to make the searches feasible. Modesitt has taken our existing indices and converted them to an Excel format that permits their inclusion into the PUC. So far, only the SCCL Denmark Books Index has been integrated into the PUC, but the indices for DWI Books and Greenland Books will follow soon. As the SCCL gets more involved with the PUC, detailed information will be included in a future column. For now, if you are interested in finding out more about the PUC, it may be searched through the APS/APRL Website at *www.stamps.org or http://stamps.org/Union-Catalog-About* link.

The presentation of the Pelander Award to the SCCL Library Committee is my opportunity to introduce the SCCL committee members in terms of their functions and contributions to our Library. The listings

that follow (in alphabetical order by last name) will be necessarily incomplete, as it is impossible to include every detail, but I hope that my ensuing text will show some of the diversity, specialization and contributions that each member brings to the table.

**Paul Albright**, our previous *Posthorn* editor, is certainly the person who comes closest to being the SCCL "Librarian" – but Paul will be the first to deny that title and declare that the SCCL is managed by committee. Paul is the person who handles most of the administrative duties, the day-to-day tasks that include processing members' requests for literature loans, first recipient of literature donations and manager of the SCCL's bank account. When you borrow materials, Paul is the person who packages and mails items, prepares and encloses invoices for postage and applicable photocopying charges. When you donate literature, he prepares the acknowledgment letter and the itemized list of donations. Paul is physically present in the SCCL about one day a week throughout the year and shares in the overall upkeep of our facility.

**Howard Benson** is the newest member of the SCCL Committee, having been named to it in Spring 2007 after serving the SCCL in an unofficial capacity for one year. Howard serves the RMPL as its stamp sale program manager, that in itself a full-time job, so he is physically present at the RMPL five days a week. Consequently, he is usually available to serve any drop-ins at the SCCL who want to tour the premises, peruse the shelves and/or borrow materials. Howard was instrumental in sorting out all the Sweden book additions, writing detailed descriptions for the (as yet incomplete but currently in progress) Sweden Books Index. Howard provided me with the sanity check for the recently completed, totally revised Denmark Books Index and worked with me at ordering, labeling and shelving this section. He will do the same for the Sweden Books Index and section within the next couple of months.

This columnist (**Roger Cichorz**) is the ongoing cataloger of books, periodicals, articles, A-V programs and E&C holdings, and manages all aspects of the SCCL Auctions. I process donations to ensure that new items get properly indexed and shelved, and that the disposition of superfluous items is handled in such a way that the SCCL benefits. I also process requests for "limited research" and do my best to provide pertinent information in a timely manner. I am physically present in the SCCL about one day a week throughout the year and share with Paul in the maintenance of our facility.

**Jim Kilbane** is currently the Vice-President of the RMPL so he is our lead advocate with the RMPL Board of Directors to ensure that SCCL gets fair treatment and respect within the RMPL community. Jim has provided SCCL with badly needed storage space at his home in the past. Thankfully, we have not had to resort to using Jim's home for the past several years, as RMPL has provided us with sufficient space for the foreseeable future. Jim has served in preparing indices for articles and scripts for A-V programs that only contained slides and lacked supporting text. He is presently working on indexing the specialist articles published in past issues of the Facit Catalog.

Jeff Modesitt is our resident computer guru and has been responsible for designing a usable, practical tabular format for the SCCL indices. Jeff is our interface with the SCC's website people to ensure that completed indices get properly posted. He most recently was involved with converting our indices to Excel spreadsheets that can be utilized for posting on the PUC. With most of the SCCL committee members not being conversant when it comes to computer software issues, we bring our problems to Jeff to solve.

**Gregory Frantz** is our "hands-on" person in many ways and resident custom carpenter. Greg configured the "labyrinth room" into a useful meandering of bookshelves that could ably accommodate our initial holdings. Once we outgrew that facility and the RMPL provided us a neighboring storage room, Greg built custom book shelves as units that could be transferred and fitted into this room, which we now term the SCCL Annex. Within weeks of acquisition, Greg transformed an unsightly storage area into a beautiful showcase library room that now houses our auction catalogs, periodicals and exhibition catalogs.

In summary, your six SCCL Committee members provide diverse and specialized talents that are essential for the library in its successful day-by-day operations. The committee functions as a team with each member making valuable, specialized contributions to the overall process.

# Examining SCC Accounts

In 2011, the Directors of the SCC decided that the club should engage persons to check on the accuracy of the major SCC accounts with various banks. The Directors felt that it would be prudent to perform this task every few years, even when nothing negative would be expected. It was also decided that the persons should be outside the club, or at least not directors, with accounting experience, not necessarily CPAs. The project was also prompted by the upcoming changes within the club with a new SCC Mart Manager and a new Executive Secretary, both taking over those functions in early 2012.

First set of accounts were those of the Executive Secretary and this exercise was completed in the first quarter of 2012 by a tax preparation service in Southern California. The report summarized the findings and suggested that additional procedures be put in place in order to perform a more comprehensive 'audit' in the future. It also stated that copies of checks were not provided to reconcile with check registers. Unfortunately, an increasing number of banks no longer provide paper checks with statements. It noted that several large debits were made to "SCC" but also acknowledged that they may not have been actual debits. In effect, these amounts were transfers from the Executive Secretary's accounts into SCC main account held by the SCC Treasurer.

Also, the new SCC Mart Manager is looking into finding an accounting person in his area to perform a similar service on Mart accounts. The Treasurer will need to do this as well. This is a good time of the year to find someone as persons with that experience may be slightly less busy than in the first quarter of a calendar year.

### Mike Falls, 1944-2012

Michael E. "Mike" Falls died at his home in Norfolk, Va., June 8 at age 68. He was Life Member No. 59 of the SCC and served on the board of directors for the term 1997-2000. He was the founder and main contact for SCC's Tidewater Chapter No. 26. He was active in Virginia area philately and held past leadership positions in the Norfolk Philatelic Society and the Virginia Beach Stamp Club.

Mike was a charter member of the Tidewater International Topics Society and its only treasurer. In the 1970s he got involved with the Vapex show and served as a board member of the Virginia Philatelic Federation and president 2001-02. He was a member also of the Military Postal History Society, the American Air Mail Society, the Postal Labels Study Group and a life member of the Perfins Club. His collecting interests included Iceland and Finnish parcel post. One specific interest was the U.S. Marines' mail in Iceland during World War II.

Mike was a welder and pipefitter for the Navy Public Works department at the Norfolk Naval Station. He retired as Planner/Estimator for Public Works. He is survived by his wife, three sons, his brother, sister and several grandchildren.

The Faroe Islands Study Circle in Britain announced the officers serving from 2012-14. Chairman is Peter Sondhelm, secretary is Norman Hudson, treasurer John Smith, librarian Keith Robinson, editor and publications manager Norman Hudson, and members' representatives are Brian Flack, Edward Samson, and Roger Tozer.

At the Swedish Philatelic Federation Congress held in Borås in April, chairman Bengt-Göran Österdahl stepped down and former vice chairman Vivi-Ann Rangfors moved up to become the new chair. The new vice chairman is Hans-Uno Hansson.

During the SFF Congress in Borås, Jan Berg received the prestigious Strandell Medal for his many years of service in the promotion of both Swedish and international philately. Last year he received the Wallberg Medal for having achieved 10 gold or large gold medals in FIP or FEPA exhibitions. His exhibit on *Samoa* is now in the FIP master class. Berg has been an invited speaker at many venues in Sweden as well as at the Royal Philatelic Society London and the Collectors Club of New York.

The headquarters of the **Danmarks Filatelist Forbund** (Danish Philatelic Federation) moved earlier this year to Løvstræde in Copenhagen. The mailing address is Box 1194, 1152 Copenhagen K, Denmark.

At the **Indonesia 2012** exhibition held in Jakarta in June, several new FIP commission chairs were named. **Lars Engelbrecht** of Denmark chairs the **Postal Stationery Commission** and **Jonas Hällström** of Sweden is the new chairman of the **Thematic Philately Commission**.

Gösta Karlsson announced the Feb. 28, 2012, passing of Swedish stamp dealer Hans Obermüller at age 69, in Spånga. Hans joined his father Franz Obermüller in running the family business, Kihlströms Frimärkshandel, in Stockholm. The firm merged into AB Philea in 1998, where he continued to work for the parent company until his death. Hans Obermüller chaired the Samlarföreningen Bältespännarna (Cinderella Collectors) and held office previously in the Swedish stamp dealers association and the Swedish Philatelic Federation.

WOPA, the **World Online Philatelic Agency**, offers new issues at face value for 15 countries, including Åland, Denmark, Faroe Islands, Greenland and Iceland. The web site is *www.wopa-stamps.com*.



Prolific Scandinavian area author **Rolf Dörnbach** of Hamburg, Germany, was honored once again with the special award of merit by the **FG Nordische Staaten**, the Nordic country study group of the **Germany Philatelic Federation**. Rolf has authored more than 500 articles on Scandinavian philately during the past 25 years, many of them long, ongoing series or columns. The study group's quarterly newsletter, *Philatelistische Nachrichten*, is housed in the **SCC Library**.

The award was presented by the study group's chairman **Bernd Fiedler** at the recent annual meeting (please see photo at left, Dörnbach at right). **Rolf Dörnbach** has previously received this same award in both 2006 and 2008.

# **News from Denmark**



Torben Hjørne Petersen illustrates mail from Greenland in the "classic" period; that is, 1700s to the 1930s, in the March issue of *Nordisk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*. In the same issue Kurt Hansen shows 18 different types of the boxed Fra Sverrig(e) markings. In the June issue Knud-Erik Andersen provides a table

showing the cost of Denmark's newspaper wrappers in quantity. In the 1870s they were available in a sheet of six and after that the wrappers were sold in bundles of 25, both at discount.

Jan Læby continues the series on the lottery system in Denmark and the Danish West Indies in the April *Dansk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*. Ib Krarup Rasmussen describes cash on delivery mail from Denmark to Norway and Sweden during the period 1918-30. Svend Bek-Pedersen reviews censorship of mail from Denmark to the United States during World War I in the June *Posthistorisk Tidsskrift*. Helge Nehm illustrates mail from Danish units of United Nations forces in Egypt and elsewhere during the 1950s in the same issue.

### **News from Canada**



In the April-June issue of *BNA Topics*, Dean Mario describes the discovery of a second proof example of the Field Post Office Z cds prepared for use by Canada's Z Force sent to Iceland in June 1940. Apparently, the cancels were never used but these two proof strikes are used but these two proof strikes are

known on unaddressed covers.

### News from the Faroes

Posta Stamps No. 11 for February, from the Faroes postal administration, provides background on recent new issues, including rescue at sea and the Maritime Rescue Coordination Center, the tourist views seen on the Europa issues and childhood ghosts and monsters.

# **News from Great Britain**

In the June London Philatelist, published by the Royal Philatelic Society London, George Størmer describes the interruption of Norwegian mail abroad in September 1855 when the two ships in service between Bergen and Hamburg — the SS Bergen and SS Norge — collided near the port of Christianssand. The Norge sank within a few minutes and the Bergen limped into port. The author mentions the salvage of mail as well as the temporary arrangements made for the next several months until regular ship service could be restored.

In the same issue, Jeffrey Stone describes the outstanding Finland collection formed by Ludvig Lindberg and its eventual dispersal at auctions in the 1920s. In the May issue of 238, journal of the Faroe Islands Study Circle, David Quayle provides the third part in his series on handling of mail in the islands during the summer of 1934, based on routes, ship sailings and other information.

In the same issue, Norman Hudson offers a profile of Peter Sofus Jahannesen, the early collector who resided in Tórshavn and produced philatelic items with the bisects and overprints. Peter Sondhelm illustrates two diplomatic mail-bag labels from the World War II period used to convey mail to the British consular office in Tórshavn.

Brian Flack provides information on airmail sent from Iceland to occupied Germany after WWII in the June issue of *Scandinavian Contact*. John Salmon and John Thomlinson offer a detailed article on the use of a computer to help identify engraving types of the Norwegian Posthorn issue NK53. Whereas

Carl Werenskiold used a ruler and magnifying glass for measurement, the co-authors recommend using a scanner, followed with a step-by-step procedure presented there.

### **News from Iceland**



Hrafn Hallgrímsson writes a profile of Icelandic artist Eggert Guðmundsson, who created paintings as well as picture post cards, in Issue No. 25 of *Frímerkjablaðið*. In the same issue, Sveinn Ingi Sveinsson celebrates the 40th anniversary of the famed Spassky-Fischer chess

match and shows some of the Icelandic philatelic memorabilia that resulted. Halfdan Helgason describes international reply coupons in Iceland.

## News from the Netherlands



In the June issue of *Het Noorderlicht*, Henk Fiolet offers the first part of a series on the Kalevala, the Finnish folklore epic. He shows stamps, cancels and covers that relate to this subject. Johan M. Vroom illustrates many of the postal markings of the Swedish post office in

Hamburg used in the 19th century. In the same issue Theo Koning provides his second installment on Arctic Vikings, this time on the discovery of America. He uses stamps of Norway, Denmark, Iceland, Åland, Greenland, Sweden and the Faroes to illustrate his story.

### News from Norway

Knut Glasø discusses Norway's justermerker (weights and measures revenue stamps) in the June issue of *NFF-Varianten*. Odd Arve Kvinnesland reviews the C.I.S. overprints of Schleswig used in 1920 and shows examples on covers in the issue 4/2012 of *Norsk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*. Geir Sør-Reime illustrates Norwegian revenues for leather and luxury goods in the same issue.

Øyvind Refsnes reproduces a number of greeting and picture post cards sent by members of the Norwegian brigades stationed in Germany during the period 1947-53 in the June *Norwegian War and Field Post Journal*. Noted aerophilatelist Egil Thomassen discusses mail flown between Sweden and Scotland during WWII and describes the aircraft used by Britain, Sweden and Norway, in the same issue. He also shows several censored covers carried on these routes, including items damaged by accident.

## News from Sweden

Bo Dahlner continues his long series on the Swedish coil stamps 1920-36 with his 10th installment in issue 3/2012 of *Svensk Filatelistisk Tidskrift*, this time focusing on the 1920 Gustaf II Adolf set. John Fritz's column on picture postcards shows illustrations of Swedish railway stations. His article created interest among other PPC collectors who responded with their favorite post cards of railway stations. Some of these appear in Fritz's column in issue 4/2012.

Also in that issue Gunnar Dahlstrand continues his series on forgeries of modern Swedish stamps and Bo Dahlner provides his 11th installment on the coil stamps.

# News from the United States

In the May issue of the *Universal Ship Cancellation Society's Log*, Phil Schreiber describes some recent postmarks from cruise ships on Norway's Hurtigruten line. The March-April issue of *Postal Stationery*, published by the United Postal Stationery Society, carried an article by Alan Warren on Sweden's 1897 Jubilee postal card, showing varieties and uses. Unfortunately some of the illustrations were duplicated and others were missing. The corrections appeared in the following May-June issue.


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
