

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A Brief History of the SCC

As historian of the SCC, I was asked to prepare an article on the history of our organization in observance of our 80th anniversary. I soon realized that the main objective of those who have been active in the SCC was to provide benefits. These include learning opportunities, a chance to add to members' collections and a sense of camaraderie to the members.


There are many methods by which SCC brings members together. Chapters, although reduced in number, still meet to provide a gathering place for people with similar interests. The Posthorn continues to be published. Members write the articles, sharing their expertise with others. The Stamp Mart (sales books) is a popular way to add to members' collections at a reasonable cost. Exhibits at stamp shows provide opportunities to showcase members' collections and to encourage new collectors to join our ranks.

Following are only a few of the highlights of the benefits that SCC members have enjoyed:

1930s

On Nov. 25, 1935, six Finnish collectors organized the Finnish-American Stamp Club in the Bronx, N.Y. Five years later there were 20 members. But, desirous of attracting other collectors, the scope of the club was expanded to include collectors of stamps from all Scandinavian countries. The name was changed to the Scandinavian Collectors Club of New York.

To promote the collecting of Scandinavian stamps throughout the United States and to exchange ideas, the Club initiated The Posthorn, with Carl E. Pelander serving as the first editor. Volume 1, number 1 was published in November 1943. Many of the articles in the first few issues were written by Pelander himself.

1940s

To provide local venues for collectors living outside of the New York area, chapters were formed. Seattle became Chapter 1 during this decade. There is conflicting information about the exact year when the chapter was formed.

Carl E. Pelander, one of the founders (and editor of The Posthorn for 6 years) was honored by Finland (the country of his birth) for his efforts in war relief during Finland's Winter War against Russia in 1939. In addition to many activities, all of the proceeds of his Handbook on the Postage Stamps of Finland, were donated towards helping the suffering of the innocent people of that war. Pelander was made Knight of the Order of the Lion of Finland, First Class, in 1948. It was the first time the order had been given to a person who was not a Finnish national.

A sales circuit was established as early as 1949. Materials sold from 1¢ to \$110. The sales manager kept a want list; there was demand for older issues. The sales circuit (now called the Stamp Mart or Scandinavian Stamp Mart) has been one of the ongoing benefits of membership in the SCC.

By 1945, a library was started. By 1949, there were 200 volumes and many pamphlets. The library was probably located in New York. There is no documentation on this

service in the SCC Archives. Library services to our members continue.

1950s

News of SCC happenings is somewhat scarce for the early years. *Posthorn* issues contained articles on stamps from the Nordic countries, names of new members and deceased members and a few notes about member activities. Members were encouraged to write articles on their philatelic research. The first few issues contained only a few pages, but by the 1950s, more pages were added to each issue. *The Posthorn* was 6 by 9 inches in size and was printed only in black and white.

In 1958, the Chicago Chapter (Chapter 4) and 10 other philatelic clubs in the Chicago area began to produce the annual Compex exhibition. The 1958 show included 935 frames of stamps, of which Chapter 4 filled 57. The emphasis for Chapter 4's frames was 19th century early material from Norway, Denmark, Iceland, Sweden and Finland. Compex is still held; exhibits are non-competitive, and all members were encouraged to show a part of their collections. The first Compex was held for three days at the LaSalle Hotel in downtown Chicago. More than 16,000 people attended.

In 1959, the name of the club was shortened to Scandinavian Collectors Club. The "headquarters" moved to Chicago, since all officers were from that area. There were "active members" who lived in the United States and had voting privileges. "Associate members" lived outside the country and could not vote. There were seven chapters located throughout the United States. These chapters gave those members living in the area the opportunity to come together to discuss their collecting interests, hear other members speak on their collections, consult circuit sales books and organize social events. Although diminished in number, SCC chapters still provide these benefits to our members.

1960s

Carl H. Werenskiold, born in Maine but raised in Norway, was one of the first in the SCC to become an honorary member. Although he began collecting world-wide stamps at a young age, he started a collection of all phases of Norwegian philately about 1940. He was a prolific writer of many articles on different aspects of philately. He received recognition for his achievements from the Oslo Filatelistklubb and the *Norsk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*.

Carl E. Pelander died Feb. 16, 1966 – he was memorialized in *The Posthorn* as the "focal point of Scandinavian philately in the U.S." *[Editor's Note: please see related article about Pelander on Page 22 of this issue.]*

In May 1966, the first national meeting of SCC was held at the international Sipex show in Washington, D.C. Regional meetings in the East and Midwest were being held and had proven to be successful. Reorganization of the club began shortly after, and within seven years membership had doubled. There were eight chapters, including ones in Toronto and Reykjavik.

In 1968 the SCC acquired the Scandinavian Stamp Mart from Northern New Jersey Chapter 9 as a gift from that chapter when members felt they could no longer handle the volume of transactions. Chapter 9 had originally organized the stamp mart in 1964 for its members.

In 1968, the Carl E. Pelander award was established; it would be given at suitable intervals to a member of SCC for outstanding work in furthering the aims of the Club and of Scandinavian philately. The first award was given to Carl H. Werenskiold.

1970s

In 1972 the Answer Men group was started. These specialists would answer questions regarding philatelic problems posed by members. All Nordic areas and the DWI would be covered. A similar service continues. The Helper's List has expert volunteers to answer questions.

A Chapter Slide Library was begun in 1975. Slide programs were organized by members and could be

<u>≻</u> 7 borrowed by Chapters to show at meetings. A script was included. Most of the slides have been converted to compact discs and are available through the SCC Library.

The SCC library was moved to Chicago in 1976; Stanley Hanson was named librarian. The library, originally begun in 1945, had been dormant since about 1960. A Library Index was compiled in 1978 and periodically updated.

In 1978, the first annual meeting of the SCC to be held outside the United States was hosted by Chapter 10 (Toronto) during the international Capex show.

1980s

The idea of an Executive Secretary was proposed in 1980. SCC had reached a critical size of more than 1,000 members. The large number of members required a person who would handle the routine day-to-day administrative duties of membership applications and records; chapter annual report forms; reproduction of official Club mailings; recruitment of new members and the ever-essential task of "etc." The first Executive Secretary was Richard Diran.

The idea of a historian for SCC was discussed during the 1980s. Dr. Frank N. Schubert volunteered for the position. He was appointed in August 1985. Dr. Schubert set up the SCC Archives.

Carl Werenskield died Jan 9, 1986. He was one of the early volunteers who gave unstintingly of his time and effort to write prolifically about philately.

In 1986, the SCC experienced a disaster. The Des Plaines River in Illinois flooded after many days of rain. Librarian Hanson's home and the SCC Library sustained considerable damage. About 30% of the library's materials were lost, mostly Finnish reference material. Several members of Chapter 4 (Chicago) took the wet materials to their homes to dry them out. Some materials could not be saved. An inventory of the entire library revealed that other materials had been lost over the years. A list of items that needed to be





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replaced was compiled and sent to members. Within a few years, thanks to the generosity of SCC members, all titles had been either donated or purchased.

1990s

In 1992, an Exhibit Coordinator was added to the roster of appointed officials. The Coordinator was to give information and advice to members who wished to exhibit their collections. The position of Computer Coordinator was also added at this time; this Coordinator was to give advice on the use of computers in philately, but by 1995 the position had been eliminated.

The Posthorn celebrated its 50th anniversary of publication in November 1993. The November issue contained articles on posthorns shown on postage stamps of several of the Nordic countries.

A sales circuit for Canada was established in 1995. This was necessary due to costs.

In 1996 the SCC was granted exemption from Federal income tax dating back to June 1995. Contributions to the organization were legally tax deductible.

Discussions about a permanent home for the SCC Library had been taking place for some time. After the Flood of 1986, the Library had been moved to the home of Dr. Willy Melberg in Wisconsin. But it was recognized that a location with better security needed to be found. The Denver Chapter (27) agreed to take on the responsibility. An agreement was signed in 1998 and the Library now resides as a specialized collection in its own room at the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library in Denver.

Internet and the 2000s

With the popularity of computers in the home a new type of Chapter was formed in June 2000. The Cyber Chapter was initiated in June 2000; members communicated by email.

The Posthorn was constantly improving. In 2000 the paper quality was upgraded to a glossy paper, which enabled a high quality of color printing, and the size was enlarged from 6 by 9 inches to 7 by 10 inches. Members found the issues much easier to read, although an ongoing problem still remained. From the early beginnings of the journal, editors have had to periodically encourage members to write articles.

In 2001, the first Nordia exhibition was held in the United States in Tucson, Ariz. Five Nordic postal museums – Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden displayed material relating to emigration to the United States from their countries. The show was held in cooperation with the American Philatelic Society's winter show and the national Aripex show. At least 100 SCC members attended.



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Carl E. Pelander Remembered

In observance of our 80th anniversary as an organization, we are publishing the obituary as it appeared in the April 1966 Posthorn. Pelander's name is synonymous with Scandinavian collecting in the United States, and his obituary gives solid information about him. Constant and the second second

Carl Pelander died the 16th of February after ailing for several years. A fighter to the last, he underwent heart surgery to remedy at least part of his condition; but two days later he succumbed to a post-operative renal insufficiency.

Carl Pelander was born in Abo, Finland, 72 years ago. While receiving his early schooling in Finland, he finished his education in U. S. A. with a B.S. from New York University and M.S. in biochemistry from Harvard.

Carl served with great distinction in the First World War, receiving the distinguished Service Cross and the French Croix de Guerre. Long active in veterans affairs, honors of all sorts were bestowed upon him. In 1926 he became a Chevalier of the French Legion of Honor.

While it is obvious Carl Pelander, as a man, deserved and received great honors, it is as a philatelist, particularly as a Scandinavian philatelist, that we of the Scandinavian Collectors Club want to remember him and in this small way pay respect to his memory.

A stamp collector all his life, and a prolific writer about stamps most of it, Carl went into philately professionally in 1937. While he was a member of A.P.S., S.P.A., Collectors Club, his main interest both as a dealer and a collector was the stamps of Scandinavia. His contribution to this field cf collecting is impossible to over-estimate, and for many years Pelander's name and Scandinavian philately were practically synonymous.

One of the founders of the Scandinavian Collectors Club, he served at different times as president and as editor of the Posthorn; as a matter of fact in the early days he sometimes had to write the entire thing himself. But actually Carl was more than a president or editor: he became the focal point of Scandinavian philately in the U. S. and few collectors of these stamps

had not sometime or another asked for his help or advice.

Any trip to New York was not complete without a visit to his office and a chat about stamps. When the S.C.C. fell on hard times, it was his efforts that kept the club alive, and almost to the very last he kept up a voluminous correspondence with his friends in the club.

And so, with our sincere condolences to his wife and our friend Elizabeth, we with thanks, respect and appreciation, dedicate this issue of the Posthorn to the memory of

The Posthorn and the SCC

The Scandinavian Collectors Club journal, *The Posthorn* first appeared in 1943 as a 6- by 9-inch leaflet and retained that size for nearly 50 years. The first issue was only eight pages. Over the years the number of pages increased. In 1973 the covers were changed from paper to stiff card.

The pages and outside covers were converted to glossy stock with the February 2000 issue. Beginning in February 2002, the size was increased to 7 by 10 inches. In November 2006 some of the pages began to appear in color, and beginning with the May 2008 issue, full color was used throughout. Below is a list of the editors from 1943 to date.

Finlandia 2017

The next major FIP exhibition in the Nordic countries will be Finlandia 2017, scheduled for May 24-28, 2017, in Tampere, Finland. More than 2,000 frames of exhibits are planned. The show will commemorate 100 years of independence of the Republic of Finland, 1917-2017. The show is recognized by FIP and is under the patronage of the Federation of European Philatelic Associations (FEPA).

In addition to the FEPA member countries of Europe, the show is also open to exhibitors from the United





States and New Zealand. The usual classes of exhibits will be accepted as well as the newer categories of Open Philately and Picture Postcards. The exhibition is organized by the Philatelic Federation of Finland and the Foundation for the Promotion of Finnish Philately. The venue is Tampere Hall, the largest conference and cultural center in Scandinavia. Some of the events will also be held at the Finnish Postal Museum, which is located in Tampere.

Tampere is easily reached from Helsinki with a two-hour ride by car or by train. There is also an airport at Tampere and the flight from Helsinki is less than half an hour. FEPA's consultant to the show is a familiar name to Nordic collectors and exhibitors – Birthe King. Some other familiar names include Jussi Tuori of the Foundation for Promoting Finnish Philately who serves as chairman of the Executive Committee, and Jukka Mäkinen who chairs the Organizing Committee.

The special individual regulations (IREX) that govern Finlandia 2017 are presented in *Bulletin 1*. Philatelic exhibits can be one frame, five frames, or eight

frames. Philatelic literature appears to be restricted to books and catalogs. The national Commissioners have not yet been appointed. Jussi Tuori will chair the jury and the secretary of the jury is Lars Engelbrecht. The remaining judges are yet to be selected.

Kjell Germeten A/S, Oslo May 2, 2015

Peer-Christian Ånensen's collections of Norwegian stamps and covers was the subject of a special dedicated 44-page auction catalog with almost 340 lots. A mint imperforate block of 30 of the 20-øre Lion II purple (NK127), with corner sheet margin (Lot 1869), was the item that achieved the highest price, selling for



(NK89-91) in corner sheet margin blocks of six, which started at \$1,800 and sold for \$2,800. Postage due sheets of the 100-øre (NKP16) and 200-øre (NKP17) stamps sold for \$7,500 and \$8,000, respectively, more than doubling the estimate and selling for around 60% of the catalog



value. The general sale included – as always – a fine range of Norway and one item in particular, an entire sheet of the 4-Skilling blue 1867 Arms issue (NK14y), mint never hinged, which sold

for \$49,000 against the estimate of \$30,600. This also was the highest price in the auction. Lot 1051, described as 700

Norwegian picture postcards in small format, from the publisher J.H. Küenholdt AS, did very well. Although the lot had a very low estimate of only \$150, it sold for \$16,900. A nearly complete plate reconstruction of the 4 sk. Arms issue of 1855, Lot 1267 (with 195 plated stamps), sold for \$12,300, some \$3,000 above the estimate. Lots 2147 and 2148, an unused set and a set on covers of the Faroe Islands Europa II 1980 burned stamps (of course in poor condition), sold for \$84 each. These stamps can be claimed as property of the Faroe Islands Post. A set of complete sheets sold for \$33,000 at a Corinphila auction in London in May 2015, this particular set was sold with permission of the Faroe Islands Post.



after starting at \$12,300. Nearly 100 lots in this sale were blocks with corner sheet margins. Lot 1833 was a set of Hakon 1907

AB Philea, Stockholm, May 23, 2015

If you ever had a dream of a being a postal museum owner, you have likely missed the opportinuty while you are reading this. The Postal Museum of Lund, Sweden, was offered for \$105,000 as Lot

2608 in this sale. It sold for \$146,000 to the lucky buyer, including the rental rights of the premises for nothing less than \$145 monthly, as well as all the museum items.

Coming back to philately, a rare money order (postanvisning) with a 30-öre Arms issue and 3-öre Lying Lion (FACIT 11e2, 14Be), sent from Nyköping to Åhus in 1869, was offered as lot 1163 at the opening price of \$6,500, but sold for \$11,500. In total 1,650 lots were offered at the public sale, including non-Swedish material.

Frimärkshuset Skandinavisk Filateli AB, May 30, 2015

Par Ballon Monté letters from Paris have always been a fascinating corner of philately. One of these letters in excellent condition, which was sent to Sweden, was offered as Lot 72 for \$3,500 and brought \$4,700. A most desirable letter with the rarely seen 17-öre bluish-grey Lying Lion type (FACIT 15c)





King Oscar II, plate proof type K 'small head,' and canceled with the Post's proofcancel "STOCKHOLM 16.7.86," quadrupled the starting price and sold for \$7,100.

on a cover mailed from Sundsvall to Copenhagen in 1869, Lot 251, was offered for \$14,200 and sold for \$16,400. This letter is also considered to be the finestknown single franking to Denmark. A rare parcel letter with the 1 Kr. Official stamp (FACIT 10a) with a total postage of 168 öre and the finest letter with the 1 Kr. Official stamp known by the auctioneer, started at \$2,100 and sold for \$5,400. Lot 565, a 20-öre blue,



The beginning of a Finland collection, and recollections of a great mentor

Ed Fraser

When I was in grade school during the 1950s, collecting stamps was easy and cheap – they came on the mail. The variety was ever changing. Not collecting stamps themselves, friends and family passed along their mail. Later, as a gift, I received some packets with an album and, again, got help from parents and grandparents.

In those days, I had time and stamp hunting was pretty interesting. I really liked that idea. By high school, on trips into Manhattan, there were many stamp stores, as well as the stamp departments in Gimbels and Woolworth's (with 2¢ each books). When I looked at catalogs, the U.S. Scott section seemed

so specialized that I couldn't really understand it, with such things as nearly invisible watermarks, rotary versus flat plate printing and other potential pitfalls. Everyone selling stamps knew the detail well already, so making an unusual find seemed very elusive.

A friend in school had a Finnish catalog that seemed interesting. The watermarks and perforations on the stamps of Finland were easy enough to check, and the stamps were cheap. So, with just a couple of dollars, I was off to visit stamp dealers in Manhattan to look at Finnish stamps as well. But there was little low-cost material to check through at dealers besides Woolworth's 2¢ books.

One dealer (Dumont Stamp), in his way of pushing me out the door, said I should go see Carl Pelander on 5th Avenue. The phone book gave an address, and it turned out to be a pretty fancy office building near Rockefeller Center. Carl Pelander's 8th-floor office was quite sparse – no floor-to-ceiling bookcases of stamp books or supplies, no piles of albums and boxes covering most of the floor. There was a tall double-door floor safe, though.

Later, I found out that he had a pretty gruff reputation, and had no qualms about telling people to go elsewhere. Also, I didn't know that he was an old-time dealer originally from Finland who now only handled high-priced material and auctions, and had not done retail "off the street" business at all for years. So, at 15 years old, I handed him a small card with a Scott numbered want list of some Finnish stamps I wanted to see – a list I had made up where either Scott didn't recognize the value or there were many better varieties Scott didn't mention.

He looked at the list and started to laugh. "You'll never find these. They are very scarce stamps," he said. He invited me to sit down, and produced an old Scandinavian catalog he had printed years earlier. He told me to take it home and read it.

On my next visit, he gave me a copy of his booklet, *The Postal Issues of Finland*, from 1940. That book became a kind of reference bible for me. It was undoubtedly the right book at the right time! Yet, in all my visits, with that book often with me, I never thought to ask him to autograph anything. Best, though, was the experience.

In subsequent visits, he and his wife would always give me something else to read or they would show me collections of things they were appraising or preparing for auction. And he demonstrated how to use watermark fluid – and to be cautious with the Carbon Tet that was his favorite choice. Repairs, thins and added teeth to serpentine roulettes made for a good demonstration. He asked me to show him what stamps I found – from Woolworths or elsewhere – that looked interesting in any way. He said just make sure anything I bought that was even slightly more expensive was returnable. He said to bring it to him and he would look at it for me ... and he did.

I lived in Queens, and it was a bus and subway trip, so I didn't get there that often – maybe every month or so on average – less when I was away at college – and it had to be a no-school or summer regular weekday. They were usually open only Monday through Friday.

In 1962, now in college, one day Mrs. Pelander recommended that I write to E.A. Hellman in Finland and buy a new book he had just published about Finnish cork cancels. She explained that it was a very

unusual book, and someday would even be a collector's item itself considering its extensive research and its low price of "only about \$16." I don't think I had ever spent \$16 for a stamp book before, but I ordered it sight unseen. It came, beautifully printed and bound, but it was a very frustrating puzzle of a book, since the text was in German and Finnish, and I could not read any of it. Slowly and unsurely I worked through the book trying to identify the cork cancels I could find. (The book was *Die Figurenstempel Finnlands – Suomen Kuvioleimat.*)

Over a period of several years, the Pelanders were philatelic mentors, and the result was that I focused on Finnish stamps. I have no language or genealogy ties to Finland or even to Scandinavia, but so it goes. In any collecting pursuit, I believe everyone can get the best collecting experience by having a good mentor.

And, today, what country do I collect? Just Finland, but I focus on the varieties not listed in most catalogs: the unusual cancels, the cork cancels, the unusual usages on cover, the shades, the unusual printings, the unusual perforation combinations, wartime mail, and even the forgeries. But, I don't collect to have every stamp, or the high valued errors, rare classic era tête-bêche pairs, or blockbuster classic covers at all. But I enjoy collecting just about everything else instead (collecting "undercover mail" is a years-later story).

The author collects Finland, as well as WWII undercover mail, especially those items related to the Thomas Cook Message Scheme. Comments, questions, and additional information are always welcome. 

Täby Church and Vasa Museum

Lester E. Winick

Longtime SCC member, author, exhibitor, judge and show executive, Les Winick, died March 5 in Galesburg, Ill., at age 87. He authored the SCC monograph, *Iceland: A Bibliography*, published



as a supplement to the August 1978 issue of *The Posthorn*. It was a compilation of philatelic articles and books in the English language. A copy of his exhibit, *Iceland Air Mail*, is in the SCC Library, as well as the 2001 Cherrystone Auctions catalog when that collection was sold.

Les wrote "The Insider" column in *Linn's Stamp News*, for more than 25 years, where he commented on current topics and was not afraid to report on matters relating to the American Philatelic Society, Universal Postal Union, United Postal Stationery Society, American Stamp Dealers Association and other organizations. In addition to this column, his articles appeared in the *Airpost Journal, Scott Stamp Monthly, American Philatelist, Philatelic Communicator* and elsewhere. He wrote a stamp column in the *Chicago Tribune* that was widely syndicated, and wrote the U.S. Market column for the British publication, *Philatelic Exporter*, for many years.

Winick is best known for his dedicated involvement with the highly

successful U.S. international show, Ameripex, held in Chicago in 1986, where he was Executive Director. He was a founding member of the Park Forest Stamp Club in Illinois, an international judge and commissioner and exhibitor. He traveled in the United States and abroad frequently and devoted much of his time to meeting with fellow collectors.

He was a former president of the Collectors Club of Chicago and the Arthur Salm Foundation. The American Topical Association named him Distinguished Topical Philatelist in 1978. The Chicago Philatelic Society presented him its Saul Newbury award in 1982 and he received the Les Shriber, Sr., trophy for the best article in the *American Philatelist* the same year. In 1997 Les was honored with the APS Luff Award for Exceptional Contributions to Philately.

Les Winick served in the United States Army Medical Corps 1944-46. Later, he moved to the Chicago area, where he was a manufacturer's representative. He was predeceased by his wife, Barbara, and son, Norm. He is survived by his daughter Diane, son Andy and daughter-in-law Christine and their families.



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Scandinavian Area Awards

Awards from several recent shows at home and abroad

Don Brent won a gold, the AAPE plan and headings award, the APS 1900-1940 medal of excellence and the Chicago Collectors Club philatelic exhibitor's award for his Denmark's Wavy Line Design: The Surface Printed Issues at Sandical in San Diego in January. He also received a vermeil and an AAPE award of honor for Kjøbenhavns By-og Hustelegraf.

Don Brent continued with another gold at AmeriStamp Expo in Riverside, Calif., in February, with his *Denmark's 1902 Design Contest*. At the same show **James Hill** received a gold, along with the AAPE novice award and the Germany Philatelic Society silver for *Graf Zeppelin Iceland Flight*. Still another gold, along with the Collectors Club of Chicago award, went to **Robert Hisey** for *The 1918 Vaasa Wartime Provisionals of Finland*.

E E E First Denmark-Sweden Charity Stamp Joint Issue



On May 7 PostNord released its first-ever joint-issue charity stamp in both Sweden and Denmark. The proceeds for this year's stamp will go to the World Wildlife Fund and its environmental work to create sustainable cities.

The charity stamps, shown at left, have the same design. In Sweden the stamps are packaged as a booklet of 10 stamps and sell for SEK 80, of which SEK 10 goes to the WWF.

This joint issue also marks the first time PostNord's logo is displayed on a postage stamp. The WWF logo also appears, along with the message, "För miljöns skull" (For the environment). The aim is to show that everyone, from private individuals to companies, can work together to better the environment.

PostNord has an ambitious environmental target - to reduce the operation's carbon dioxide emissions by 40 percent from 2009-20. A part of this target, according to PostNord, will be achieved by streamlining its transport chains and making investments in fuelefficient vehicles.

What appears to be a relatively new Nordic country collecting group in France is **Groupement Philatélique France Scandinavie**. The group's website is *www.gpfs-online.org*, where it has a membership application, new issue information, illustrations of stamps of the Nordic countries and a list of links that includes the SCC website. By clicking on the stamp illustrations, details pop up, including production and current values.

Scandinavian Literature Notes

News from Denmark



Allan Brink offers an introduction to studying the bicolor issues of Denmark, both the skilling and øre values, in the February *Dansk Filatelistisk*

Tidsskrift. He provides a sorting table by value, date of issue, perforation and

watermark varieties. Tony Gade studies the purser markings on postal stationery of the Danish West Indies carried on the Hamburg American Line.

Lasse Nielsen illustrates plate flaws of the 1864 3-skilling crown, sword and scepter issue in the March *Nordisk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*. Leif Ørndorf provides another installment of his series reflecting on the great philatelist G. A. Hagemann.

Niels Schou describes and illustrates handstamped postal markings of Denmark's Foot Post in the March issue of *Posthistorisk Tidsskrift*. He tabulates six basic types of marks used during the prestamp period and six more during the use of adhesives. In the same issue, Finn Skriver shares the contents of several solders' letters related to Gjedved during the period 1862-64. The location is a small village north of Horsens.

News from the Faroes



Issue No. 22 of *Posta Stamps* from November 2014 carries a table of the new Faroese letter postal rates effective Jan. 1, 2015. The table lists small, medium and large letter sizes and the respective rates for domestic mail, A-letter (air) rates to Europe including the other Nordic

countries and to all other countries, and also the B-letter (surface) rates to those country groups.

In February the Faroes issued stamps to mark the opening of a new terminal at Vágar airport. Another set of stamps commemorates the 1833 expedition to the Faroe Islands of George Clayton Atkinson, the British naturalist and artist. The scenes are reproductions of paintings based on Atkinson's original sketches made during his expedition.

Pól Jespersen writes about the total eclipse experienced by the Faroes on March 20 this year and the 17 Kr and 19 Kr stamps issued on March 11 for the occasion, in *Posta Stamps* No. 23. Posta offers a souvenir sheet, first-day covers and other postal items related to this issue on its website: *www.stamps.fo*.

News from Germany



In the February issue of *Philatelistische Nachrichten*, Rolf Dörnbach continues his descriptive series on the islands in the Faroes. This time he looks at Borðoy. Rolf also discusses the newly completed airport terminal building at Vágar. Turning to Iceland, Rolf describes the

new rubber handstamp used at Iceland post offices. They are made by the Austrian firm Colop and the outer circle diameter is 28 mm.

In the same issue, Robert Dautz continues his series on small towns of Sweden with an overview of Undersåker and examples of its postmarks from 1887 to the 1970s. Manfred Lübbert illustrates an insured letter sent from Åland to Denmark in 2014.

News from Great Britain



David Macdonald continues his series on the private ferry stamps of Denmark in the March *Scandinavian Contact*, with illustrations of those of six different firms. In the same issue, Peter Hellberg provides part 4 of his series on Sweden's postförskott or cash-on-delivery fee, this

time for the period 1910-14.

Jonas Hällström writes in some detail about Denmark's Caravel postal stationery 1927-52 in the March issue of the *London Philatelist*. He discusses the different printers used over the years, the rates and

provides an extensive tabulation of control numbers on letter cards, postal cards and reply cards. In the April *Civil Censorship Study Group Bulletin*, Peter Burrows provides an English translation of a scarce Danish form No. 16 inserted into covers returned to the sender during WWII. The form lists various reasons for the return including crossword puzzles and chess moves, shorthand writing, printed matter that can be shipped only by the publisher and contents written in secret language or braille or Hebrew.

Norman Hudson reports the opening of a new post office in the Faroes in the May issue of 238: Journal of the Faroes Islands Study Circle. The location is the Vágar airport and the newly constructed terminal building, completed last year. In the same issue, Brian Cox discusses the many birds seen on stamps of the Faroes. Peter Sondhelm provides the second part of his series on censored Faroe mail of World War 1.

News from Iceland



Saso Andonov provides a history of savings stamps in Iceland 1907-85 in the Issue 17 of *Frímerkjablaðið*. The intent of the program was to encourage young people to save for the future, workers to save for capital purchases, and employees to save for vacation.

News from the Netherlands



John Vroom provides a historic overview of Denmark's first postage stamp, the 4 R.B.S., in the March issue of the Dutch journal *Het Noorderlicht*. In the same issue, Henk Fiolet illustrates some of Finland's picture postcards, especially those sold for fighting tuberculosis.

Vroom looks at postage stamp booklets with advertising labels in the June issue, with a focus on those of Denmark. In the same issue, Henk Fiolet profiles the work of Finnish artist Martta Wendelin, who illustrated children's books, magazine covers, postcards and, especially, Christmas cards.

News from Norway

Øyvind Refsnes presents a profile of Norwegian stamp designer Enzo Finger in the 1/2015 issue of *Norsk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*. Since 1994 Finger has designed 188 stamps. In the same issue, veteran Norwegian philatelist Finn Aune reflects on the recent Nordia 2014 exhibition and his exhibits that earned a gold with special prize, a large vermeil and a large silver. Aune also discusses exhibiting in general, his own experiences in exhibiting over the years and some of the other displays at the Nordia show.

Knut Arveng shows some photographs and one piece of mail pertaining to the German naval base at Trondheim during WWII in the March issue of *Norwegian War and Field Post Journal*. Kjell Nilson shows an airmail cover sent from Toronto's Little Norway via London to someone in the Norwegian Legation in Stockholm. On arrival in Sweden, a Swedish stamp was applied for airmail service back to London to the addressee. John Torstad shows another Canadian cover sent airmail to someone in Uppsala, and then forwarded to the Norwegian garrison at Mauritzberg in Sweden. Both covers bear the red O.A.T. marking in an oval.

The issue 2/2015 of *Norsk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift* reports a modern error on a recent Norwegian stamp. It is the 19 Kr in the Constitution series, NK 1885, depicting a lion. However, the engraved brown coloring of the lion is missing and all that is seen is the outline of the albino figure. The stamp was printed in two stages – offset and engraved. The theory is that static electricity caused two sheets to cling together so that the bottom one was not printed during the engraving phase.

The error was discovered by a collector who bought a block of 25 stamps at the Åsane post office in northern Bergen. Conjecture implies that at least some of the other 25 stamps in the pane may have been sold to customers and therefore could exist on cover. In the same issue Trond Schumacher continues his series on the history of the post office at Nordkap, showing postmarks mostly during the 1930s.

Øyvind Refsnes examines five covers that claim to be first day covers of Norway No. 1 in the issue 3/2015 of *Norsk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*. Despite the large number of Norway's first stamp that were printed

and the availability of cancels at many Norwegian post offices on Jan. 1, 1855, only these first-day covers are known. Each of the covers is analyzed by the author and their sale in auctions is summarized. The discussion includes which covers are genuine, which are questionable and which are definitely false.

Knut Glasø provides part 4 of his series on the Norwegian railway freight stamps in the March issue of NFF Varianten.

News from Sweden

In the issue 2/2014 of the Cinderella journal *Bältespännaren*, Peter Nordin illustrates a number of different R- and V-labels (etiquettes) and describes their type styles. Per Sundberg reports the discovery of a new type of stamped paper (Charta Sigillata) of Swedish Pomerania in the 1/2015 issue of *Svensk Filatelistisk Tidskrift*. The usual new installments are provided in the same issue by Bo Dahlner on the 35-öre Gustaf V profile coil issue of 1920-36, and Peter Nordin's series on registration labels, this time about provisional ones including some that have hand-written information. Thomas Wallner discusses 19th-century sea post mail from Malmö to Germany and elsewhere via Stralsund.

Staffan Bengtsson illustrates colored handstamp markings of Halland Province in the issue 2/2015 of *Svensk Filatelistisk Tidskrift*. He shows markings of Laholm, Halmstad and other locations, as well as railway markings, on stamps and covers from the skilling period up to modern times. Issue 3 has continuations of the Nordin registry label and Dahlner coil issue series. Gunnar Dahlstrand shows genuine and counterfeit stamps of the recent "cookies" issue.

SFT 4/2014 continues with Peter Nordin's descriptions of Sweden registry etiquettes, Type 3 (1912-21), Type 4 (1921-45) and Type 5 (1945-69). Martin Blom presents a profile of Sweden expert Helena Obermüller Wilén and her 30 years of expertizing.

News from the United States

In a special online supplement to the Feb. 20 issue of *Mekeel's & Stamps*, Christer Brunström describes the radio license stamps of Sweden. These license fee stamps first appeared in 1928 in a 10-SEK denomination. During the 1950s the fee was increased quickly to 15-, 20-, and then 30 Kr, each time requiring a new stamp issue. The stamps were issued, along with a control stamp, in

pairs. The fee stamp was affixed to the license and the control stamp retained by the authorities.

Brunström also writes about the Swedish local post of Gävle in the March 6 issue of the online journal *stampnewsnow.com*. Just after WWII, Sweden increased the local rate, spawning many private local posts around the country. R.E. Wenngren opened his Gävle local post company March 26, 1945, with the release the same day of 4- and 8-öre stamps. The rate for an unsealed local letter was 8-öre. The local post continued until new government regulations in 1947 caused these private companies to close.

John J. Henry describes the Norwegian skilling postal cards of 1872-77 in the May-June *Postal Stationery*. He delves into cliché types, cutting guide lines, frame corner types and other varieties.

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From the Stacks

The Quest for Information on Norway No. 1 Watermark Varieties

As promised in my previous column, here is a summary of some successful "limited research" done on Norway's first postage stamp and its unusual watermark using SCC Library resources. This subject all started when Warren Grosjean inquired about the listings for Norway No. 1 in the Facit *Special-katalog* and *Norgeskatalogen* and, after some initial back-and-forth correspondence, it soon ballooned into a more rigorous search for information! Before I get into all that, a primer on the Watermark follows.

Norway No. 1's Unusual Watermark Explained

Norway No. 1, the 4-skilling blue stamp released in 1855, depicts the Norwegian coat of arms with a lion rampant holding St. Olaf's axe, facing left within a crowned shield. Its watermark is the Norwegian lion holding St. Olaf's axe. This watermark was produced in an unusual manner, being raised in relief, rather than as a thinning of the paper. Normally, protruding watermark forms are soldered to the surface of the paper mold or dandy roll, but in this instance a steel watermark die was impressed into the mold surface, producing a depression. This resulted in a Watermark on the stamps about 0.01 mm thicker than the surrounding paper (which varies from 0.06 mm to 0.10 mm thick). Watermarks of this type were introduced by Norwegian architect Oluf Nicolai Roll and, apart from Norway No. 1, are only known used for the early printings of the first Russian stamps.

These watermarks were positioned on the sheets to fit the printing plate, one full watermark for each stamp. The printing instructions were that the lion in the watermark should be in the same position as the lion in the printed design when the stamps were viewed from the front. This means that when the stamps are viewed from the back, with the stamps in an upright position, the lion in the watermark faces right. At the time of the printing of Norway No. 1, postal authorities were aware that watermark errors could occur and instituted an inspection process. Despite care during the paper manufacture inspection to remove sheets in which the watermark was inverted, the correctly produced sheets could still be accidentally reversed, turned upside-down, or both reversed and turned upside-down when placed in the printing press.

Despite further inspection after the stamps were printed (and any reversed or inverted sheets removed and destroyed), a few error sheets nonetheless must have passed the control without being noticed, as stamps with reversed or inverted watermarks have been found. Norway No. 1 with reversed watermark (lion facing left as seen from the back of the stamp in upright position) is very rare, and inverted watermark (lion upside down facing left as seen from the back of the stamp in upright position) is extremely rare. Stamps with the third error position of inverted and reversed watermark, if they exist, have yet to be found.

Initial Literature Searches for Reversed and Inverted Watermark Varieties

Warren specializes in Norway No. 1 and has put together an award-winning one-frame exhibit, but does not possess an inverted watermark stamp. He questioned whether the inverted-watermark variety exists, as he had never encountered one in all his years of acquiring and studying Norway No. 1 stamps. It was at this point my research began in earnest. I examined the listings in all the auction catalogs in the SCCL E&C section that featured Norway No. 1 – specifically, 11 "name" sales conducted from 1929-87 by H.R. Harmer, Robson-Lowe, Schwenn, Arnold Ebel and Postiljonen. In these auctions, Norway No. 1s were generally grouped/categorized by cancellation types, uses on cover, plate flaw varieties and "freaks" (paper



creases, printing aberrations and more). But despite the countless specialized lot listings for the various varieties, none of these sales included either of the two watermark varieties!

Perhaps they were unknown or unavailable during that span of 59 years or were simply not considered an important enough "error" variety to mention in the lot descriptions. It was at this point that I examined past issues of Facit *Specialkatalog* and *Norgeskatalogen* to see when they were first listed, speculating that – from their lack of appearance in the auction catalogs – perhaps these varieties were discovered and reported in the late 1980s. This proved not to be the case!

Surprisingly, *Norgeskatalogen* does not list and price these errors, but at the end of the Norway No. 1 listings, the note "omvendt og speilvendt vannmerke er påvist" ("inverted and reversed watermarks are known") appears starting with the 1959 edition, running to the present. Editions prior to 1950 of *Katalog over Norges Frimerke* (as *Norgeskatalogen* was then titled) did not mention these varieties, and they made their initial appearance in the 1951 edition as a (somewhat ambiguous?) note "feilkjennes – likesä omvendt og speilvendt vannmerke" (incorrectly identified – likewise "inverted and reversed watermarks").

Facit *Specialkatalog* lists and prices both known error varieties, but only as used stamps, and up until the 2014 edition had errors in these listings, which I will discuss shortly. To its credit, Facit has always attempted specialized treatment of Norway No. 1, even more so than the *Norgeskatalogen*. It is interesting how Facit evolved over just one decade and greatly expanded listings for Norway No. 1 from its 1948 edition (two plate flaw varieties plus two types of cancels and no mention of pairs or multiples, nor of the watermark varieties) to its 1959 edition (10 plate flaw varieties, all illustrated, plus three types of cancels, 5 multiples and still no mention of the watermark varieties). The latest Facit editions still mirror the Norway No. 1 listings in its 1959 edition, but with a few tweaks, such as listing multiples before the plate flaw varieties, starting with the 1965 edition and changing nomenclature designations.

The first listing appearance of the two Norway No. 1 watermark varieties occurred in the 1980-81 edition as "xx spegelvänt vm" ("mirrored image Watermark" = "reversed Watermark") valued from SEK5000 and "xx1 upp och nedvånt vm" ("inverted Watermark"), not valued. The listing error initially occurred in the 1985 edition when "vm1" and "vm2" designations were used in place of the previous "xx" and "xx1" and an added English translation followed the Swedish entry. These were now listed as "vm1 spegelvänt vm / inverted (sic) wm" and "vm2 upp och nedvänt vm / reversed (sic) wm" — with the English text in error, exactly the translation opposite, and it continued that way through the 2013 edition!

The 2014 edition attempted to correct this error, but in the process erroneously listed "reversed" for both varieties. SCCL does not have the 2015 edition, but Jay Smith kindly provided me with a scan of the Norway No. 1 page, and it now correctly lists the English translations. One error that still appears in the English portion of the caption for the illustration of the "spegelvänt vm," as seen from the back of the stamps, is incorrectly labeled "inverted wm" instead of "reversed wm"! In fairness to Facit, despite these errors in translating Swedish to English, the listings are priced accordingly in terms of the relative rarity of the two watermark varieties, with the rarer "vm2 upp och nedvänt vm" listed at 250% higher than "vm1 spegelvänt" in its several latest editions (currently priced at SEK20,000 and SEK 50,000, respectively).

A Eureka Moment - My First Sighting of an Inverted Watermark Variety!

Up to this point, I still had not spotted an inverted watermark variety to confirm its existence. After striking out with the early auction catalogs in the E&C section, it dawned on me to check that section for Norway No. 1 exhibits. Sure enough, my eureka moment arrived when I accessed a photocopy of the Jared ("Jed") H. Richter (under his pseudonym "Vi King") exhibit, titled *Norway, The Skilling Era, 1855 Through 1876* (E&C 12), which received the Grand Award at the1985 Westpex show. The exhibit not only contained a used single inverted watermark variety (with Drammen "48" numeral postmark), but had a unique used (mute postmarked) vertical strip of three with reversed watermarks and three other used singles with reversed watermarks! Richter's description on the exhibit page with these five items reads: "Although 213,600 stamps were rejected and destroyed by the postal controllers, due to the watermark not being in the

normal position, some sheets must have slipped through undetected, for about 15 reverse watermark and six inverted watermark copies are known. The three strip is the only recorded multiple."

The contents of Richter's exhibit were subsequently sold as "The 'Vi King' Norway Collection formed by Mr. Jared H. Richter" in 281 lots at the Kjell Germeten A/S Auction No. 31, held May 2, 1987, in Oslo (E&C 22). Richter's inverted watermark variety was accompanied by a F. C. Moldenhauer certificate and offered as lot No. 2023. Described as "one of only six copies" and given an estimate of NOK10,000, it realized NOK18,000 (~\$2,650 at that time). Lot No. 2019 was Richter's unique reversed Watermark strip of three. Described as "a great rarity; no other multiple with reversed watermark recorded," it was estimated at NOK30,000 and sold for NOK41,000 (~\$6,030). Lot No. 2033 was a used (mute postmark) reversed watermark single accompanied by an APS Certificate, described as a "nice even-margined copy, tiny thinning nearly invisible, a rare item." It was given an estimate of NOK4000 and realized NOK8500 (~\$1,250). The two other used reversed watermark varieties in Richter's exhibit (with Bergen circular datestamp and 153 numeral postmark, respectively) were not in the Germeten "Vi King" auction catalog.

One might think that rare watermark varieties would be showcased at the beginning of or highlighted within the auction's Norway No. 1 lot listings, but this was not the case in this Germeten sale as they were "buried" among the other Norway No. 1 lots! I suppose one could argue that their high estimates compared to those of the surrounding lots were sufficient to draw attention to them.

Additional Sightings and Provenance of Some Richter Rarities

I was still curious about where Richter's watermark varieties came from and ended up, so my search continued. Dr. Roger G. Schnell purchased many of the Richter lots at the Germeten auction as they appeared in his two Gold Medal Award-winning exhibits of Norway No. 1 developed in 1988 and the 1990s, titled *The First Stamps of Norway* and *The First Stamps of Norway*, *Plate Reconstruction* (E&C 30 and E&C 168). Schnell's earlier exhibit contained no inverted watermark variety and only one reversed watermark variety, the mute postmarked single sold as lot No. 2033 in the "Vi King" auction. Schnell's later exhibit focused completely on constant plate varieties and their positions on the printing plates and contained neither of the watermark varieties, so we can presume the two other aforementioned Richter lots were sold in the Germeten sale to other buyers.

At this point in my "limited research" investigation, a light bulb went on and I decided to peruse the SCCL's audio-visual section for programs on Norway No. 1 and, once again, I struck pay dirt! A-V 7 is titled *Norway No. 1, Coat-of-Arms 4-Skilling Blue Issue of 1855* and looked promising. It turns out to be Part 1 of the Hafnia 1976 Grand Prix Exhibit of Einar Lundstrom, consisting of 55 slides and 11 pages of descriptive text to accompany the slides — thankfully, the slides were subsequently copied onto a CD to accommodate viewing on a computer screen. Lo and behold, Lundstrom's exhibit contained one page of three used watermark variety stamps, one with reversed watermark and two with inverted watermarks.

Lundstrom's reversed watermark stamp was canceled with a numeral "159" (Kongsvinger) postmark and both of his inverted watermark stamps were canceled with a numeral "48" (Drammen) postmark. The reversed watermark "159"-postmarked stamp was one of the three singles later residing in the Richter exhibit. Although the Richter exhibit's inverted watermark example was postmarked "48," it was neither of the two in the Lundstrom exhibit! This means at least three of the six recorded examples were all postmarked in Drammen, so possibly other Drammen used stamps on and off cover may be inverted watermark varieties and it may benefit you to examine them carefully. What I found to be even more remarkable was that Richter's unique reversed watermark strip of three resided in Lundstrom's exhibit, but was not identified as having reversed watermarks, indicating Richter must have subsequently made this discovery after he obtained this item!

I then searched the E&C section for the Lundstrom "name sale" auction without success, but I just happened upon the Ebel-Auktion (Frankfurt, Germany) catalog of March 3, 1984, titled the "Per Fossum' Grand-Prix-Collection" (E&C 166G). The text inside indicated that this sale included the Hafnia

1976 Grand Prix Exhibit without naming Lundstrom. (What's with the pseudonyms?!) Sure enough, in looking through the offerings, I found two of the Norway No. 1 watermark varieties in Lundstrom's exhibit. Unfortunately, the SCCL does not have the prices realized for this sale, but there are manuscript annotations (\$ amounts) next to some of the lots (and I assumed these to be what those lots sold for). The numeral "159"-postmarked reversed watermark stamp was offered at a starting bid of DM2000 (~\$732 at that time), but apparently it did not sell (judging by the lack of annotated entry). One of the two numeral "48"-postmarked inverted watermark stamps was offered at a starting bid of DM1750 (~\$674) and apparently sold for \$596. Remarkably, Lundstrom's unique strip of three with the reversed watermark that turned up in Richter's exhibit and later sold in the "Vi King" auction was not among the lots offered.

Conclusion: The SCCL Is Your Approachable Valuable Resource

There will be more to this discussion, as Warren's exhibit of Norway No. 1 is still a work in progress and, as the complete story unfolds, I promise to follow it up in a future column. In the meantime, Warren kindly donated a color photocopy of his recently revised one-frame exhibit to the SCCL (E&C 278). What I attempted to emphasize here is how valuable a resource the SCCL can be, particularly the E&C section in determining the provenance of rare stamps and covers within an historical perspective via exhibits and auction catalogs.

What I have concluded is that exhibits and auction catalogs of specialized areas provide valuable information and may be as – or even more – useful than comprehensive handbooks. So, if you are attempting to put together a specialized collection or exhibit, rather than starting from scratch, it may benefit you to visit the SCCL online catalog and see what is available to prevent you from having to reinvent the wheel. Of course, visiting the SCCL in person might be of even greater benefit. Another approach is to contact me with your requests and I will do my best to provide guidance on what is available at the SCCL to help with your pursuits. My contact information appears at the end of this column. The SCCL is your approachable resource in this regard, so please utilize it as a principal SCC membership advantage!

I would be remiss if I did not mention Tore Gjelsvik's classic reference book, *Norway Number One, The New Handbook*, Second Edition (NFF, Oslo/Bergen, 2000, ISBN 82-9027271-5), available at SCCL as NOR B145E. It is an excellent comprehensive reference work concerning Norway No. 1's background, production particulars, plating, distribution, use, cancellations/postmarks, reprints, reproductions and forgeries. However, it would not be useful for finding most of the research information presented here.

This 8¹/₄- by 11³/₄-inch German-language journal ranges from 34-48 pages per issue (40-page average for this run), is profusely illustrated in black and white and contains articles ranging from prepostage-stamp postal history to modern stamps of eight areas (Åland, Denmark, Faroes, Finland, Greenland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden). Annual subscription cost is 26 euros (~\$8 per issue), but the starting bid for this lot is only 50¢ per issue. CMV = \$40, Starting Bid = \$2.50.
- 13. Scandinavia/Worldwide/United States Revenues: Riley's Fiscal Philatelic Literature Handbook, by Richard F. Riley, published as The American Revenuer, Volume 51, Number 6, June 1997, by the American Revenue Association, Rockford, Iowa, 224 pages, softbound, pristine. Bibliography listing more than 7,200 articles on revenue stamps of the world, including all Scandinavian and Nordic countries. CMV = \$15, Starting Bid = \$4.
- 14. United States/Miscellaneous: The Congress Book 2004, Richard W. Helbock (Editor), American Philatelic Congress, iv + 230 pages, profusely illustrated, hardbound, pristine. Anthology of eight in-depth articles: "California Pre-Statehood Mails from Sacramento," "19th Century Postal History of Yellowstone National Park," "Early Postal History of Tennessee," "Laws Governing Tariffs and Hand Stamps on Haitian Revenue Paper," "Astrophilatelic Rendition of the Conquest of Space," "Laos Beyond the Scott Catalog," "Official Seals of Egypt" and "Maritime Markings of Algeria from 1810 to 1875." - Sweden/Postal Stationery: The 15 "PS" lots that follow come from a generous donation by an SCC member and are groupings of used, unused and mixes of used and unused Swedish postal stationery items. Although the auctioneer attempted to accurately describe and determine the market value of each lot, bidders are reminded of the auction term that lots consisting of multiple non-book items are only approximately described, so slight inaccuracies in the item counts and descriptions are not cause for return. Denmark and Greenland/Stamps: The next 15 lots come from a generous donation by one SCC member and are complete official year packs produced, respectively, by the Denmark and Greenland postal administrations. All year packs are in pristine, as-issued condition, still in their sealed poly sleeve protective packing (except Denmark 1985). The stamp counts given for the Denmark books are estimated from the Facit number listings for stamps issued each year, not from an actual examination of the yearbook contents, so counts may vary slightly from those given.



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
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
